FROGS FACE FOURTH RANKED FOR IN SIX GAMES, HOST NO. 25 WEST VIRGINIA

TCU continues a demanding portion of its 2015-16 season on Sunday when it faces its fourth ranked opponent in six games in hosting No. 25 West Virginia at Ed and Rae Schollmaier Arena.

Tipoff is set for noon CT. The game will be televised on Fox Sports Southwest with Chuck LaMendola (play-by-play) and TCU great Janice Dziuk (analyst) on the call. The game is also available on the radio via KTCU 88.7 FM in the DFW Metroplex and through GoFrogs.com with Jeff Williams (play-by-play) on the call. It is the final home game before TCU embarks on a three-game road swing that includes dates at Iowa State, Oklahoma State and Oklahoma.

The West Virginia game marks the end of a six-game stretch for the Horned Frogs that pits the Frogs against four ranked opponents in #17 Oklahoma on Jan. 6, #6 Baylor on Jan. 9, #6 Texas on Jan. 20 and #25 West Virginia on Jan. 24. TCU will have faced six ranked teams by the end of January thanks to two games against ranked foes this week. It is the first time in program history that TCU will have played six ranked teams in a season before the month of January ends. With a second game against current ranked teams Oklahoma, Texas, Baylor and West Virginia still likely on the 2015-16 schedule, the Frogs are in line to face a record number of ranked foes in 2015-16. TCU faced 10 ranked foes during the 2005-06 season. It faced nine ranked foes in 2012-13 and 2013-14. TCU has previously faced seven or more ranked foes in 1994-95, 2005-06, 2010-11, 2012-13 and 2013-14.

2015-16 HIGHLIGHTS

- TCU overcame a 15-point second half deficit on Dec. 30, 2015 to beat Texas Tech in Lubbock to help TCU win their Big 12 Conference opener for the first time in program history. The Frogs opened league play with a 2-0 record.
- TCU began play in the new Ed and Rae Schollmaier Arena on Dec. 20, 2015 with a win over Southern Utah. The \$72 million renovation gives TCU one of the nation's premier basketball venues.
- TCU ended its two-year tenure in the University Recreation Center on Dec. 12, 2015 when the Horned Frogs hosted No. 3/3 Notre Dame. The Frogs went 21-4 in 25 games in the venue with three of the four losses coming at the hands of teams ranked in the top five nationally. The tenure in the venue included a 12-game home winning streak that was the third longest in TCU history for home games.
- Zahna Medley and Veja Hamilton earned preseason All-Big 12 Conference honors in a vote of the league's coaches. Medley earned first team honors while Hamilton was awarded honorable mention selections.
- TCU was picked to finish fifth in the Big 12 Conference in a tally of the league's head coaches. TCU was just one point behind fourth place Iowa State. The Frogs have finished ahead of where they were picked in the preseason standings in the league in each of the last two seasons.
- The Horned Frogs have signed one of the best recruiting classes in program history and one of the nation's top 10 classes this year with the November 2015 signings of Amber Ramirez, Mikayla Christian, Kianna Ray, Ella Hellessey and Danielle Rainey. Ramirez is the top signee in the class and is ranked among the top 15 players nationally, making her the second highest rated player to sign with TCU in program history behind Sandora Irvin (ranked 6th prior to joining Frogs).

00 AMY OKONKWO • Soph. • F • 6-2 • Fontana, Calif. (USC)

Transfer from USC that will sit out the 2015-16 season due to NCAA transfer rules... Competed in 27 games as a true freshman in 2014-15... Averaged 3.3 points and 2.1 rebounds in 7.1 minutes per game while converting on 52 percent of her shots (35-of-68)... Rated as a top-100 prospect nationally as a senior at Etiwanda High School... Named to Los Angeles Times' All-Star Team as a senior after averaging 13.7 points and 8.3 rebounds per game.



1 TOREE THOMPSON • Soph. • G • 5-10 • Broken Arrow, Okla. (Ole Miss)

One of the nation's premier three-point shooters, rising to the top of the nation three point field goal percentage rankings in late December at the unofficial end of non-conference play entering Christmas break... Transfer from Ole Miss who sat out the second semester of 2014-15 season after playing fall semester for the Rebels... Eligible to play entire 2015-16 season at TCU due to NCAA waiver...



3 VEJA HAMILTON • Sr. • G • 5-10 • Spring, Texas (Klein Collins HS)

Preseason All-Big 12 Conference Honorable Mention selection... Second team All-Big 12 Conference selection last season... Ranked second on team in scoring last season with 11.3 points, plus had 4.5 rebounds, 1.7 assists, 1.5 steals... Led team and ranked sixth in Big 12 in field goal percentage at 48.9 percent... Improved scoring average from 4.9 to 11.3 points in her first year under Raegan Pebley at TCU.



14 ZAHNA MEDLEY • Sr. • G • 5-6 • Springfield, Ill. (Springfield HS)

ALL-AMERICAN CANDIDATE

Senior CLASS Award candidate... Active career leader in points in Big 12 Conference... Surpassed the 1,600 point mark for her career in the contest vs. No. 3/3 Notre Dame... Preseason All-Big 12 Conference First Team selection... All-American candidate... Third in scoring among returning players in Big 12 Conference... Two-time first team All-Big 12 Conference selection... Fastest in program history to reach 1,000 points... Had 9 3's in 2012-13 game vs. SMU, tying the TCU record 4th-most in Big 12 history, finished with 35 points.



15 JADA BUTTS • Jr. • G • 5-10 • Lewisville, Texas (Lewisville HS)

Moved to role off the bench prior to the Southern Utah game... Averaged 5.1 points and 2.5 rebounds in 15.4 minutes last season... One of six Horned Frogs to connect on 15 or more 3-pointers (15-48) last season... Shot 39 percent (53-137) from the field, 31 percent (15-48) from 3-point range and 70 percent (41-59) from the free-throw line last year... Posted nine points and sank a pair of 3-pointers against Texas in the Big 12 Championship quarterfinals... Rattled off career-high 21 points to help lead TCU to WNIT opening-round win over SFA.



21 SYDNEY COLEMAN • So. • F • 6-1 • Cypress, Texas (Cypress Ranch HS)

Saw action in 17 contests, including nine Big 12 games last season... Scored first points at TCU with a bucket against SMU on Nov. 19... Saw action in league games against Iowa State, Kansas, Baylor, K-State, Oklahoma, West Virginia and Texas... Ranked as the No. 15 overall player in Texas by Premier Basketball Report and the 47th overall nationally at her position by ESPN HoopGurlz at Cypress Hills High School.



22 JORDAN MOORE • Fr. • C • 6-3 • Round Rock, Texas (Stony Point HS)

Rated as the No. 47 recruit nationally by All Star Girls Report and the No. 54 recruit overall in the ESPN HoopGurlz... Also tabbed a four-star recruit by ESPNW and the No. 8 post player nationally... Has been strong shot blocker for the Frogs in the early going of the 2015-16 season... Averaged 21.7 points, 9.6 rebounds and 2.7 blocks per game as a senior at Stony Point High... Also had 1.5 steals per game as a senior... Team finished the season 22-14 as a senior... Named the All-Central Texas Player of the Year for the 2013-14 season as a junior after averaging 20.8 points, 11.9 rebounds and 2.5 blocks.



23 AJ ALIX • RS Soph. • G • 5-6 • Houston, Texas (Bellaire HS)

Scored career best 24 points at No. 12/12 Texas A&M on Nov. 21, 2015 after hitting her first six three-point attempts in the game... Saw action in 27 contests, averaging 8.6 minutes per game last season... Averaged 3.1 points, 0.7 rebounds and 0.6 assists per contest... One of six Horned Frogs to connect on 15 or more 3-pointers (16-54) last season... Shot 32 percent (29-91) from the field, 30 percent (16-54) from 3-point range and 82 percent (9-11) from the free-throw line in 2014-15.



31 DESTYNEE HIVES-MCCRAY • RS-Sr. • F • 6-0 • Arlington, Texas (SMU)

Graduate transfer student that is using final year of eligibility to play with the Horned Frogs after spending last four seasons at SMU, including a redshirt year in 2013-14 for medical reasons after playing in just 10 games to begin the season... Played in 28 games with 24 starts as a redshirt junior at SMU... Second on the team with 9.9 points per game, scoring 278 points... Had 12 points and four rebounds in 20 minutes playing against her former team on Nov. 18 in an 89-79 win.



32 CAITLIN DIAZ • Sr. • F • 6-1 • Tomball, Texas (Tomball HS)

Made major progress on the court in the offseason, including improved three-point shooting... Matched 2014-15 three-point production in TCU's nine game of the 2015-16 season when she hit her fifth three of the year. It came on her 13th attempt of the year... Competed in 26 contests, averaging 8.0 minutes per game last season... Averaged 1.7 points and 2.3 rebounds per game while shooting 35 percent (15-43) from the field, 29 percent (5-17) from 3-point range and 71 percent (10-14) from the free-throw line.

Compiled four career triple-doubles, 97 career double-doubles in 130 career games played, including seven career Texas UIL playoff games.



42 HATTIE LANKFORD • Fr. • G • 6-0 • Oklahoma City, Okla. (Bishop McGuinness HS)

Walk-on for the Horned Frogs... Helped lead Bishop McGuinness during the program's first season competing in Class 6A in state of Oklahoma... Also ran track during time at Bishop McGuinness... Averaged 4.4 points, 8 rebounds and two blocks per game as a senior while contributing 1.5 steals... Shot 50 percent from the field and 70 percent from the free throw line during her career... Led team in rebounding and blocked shots as both a junior and senior.



44 CLAIRE FERGUSON • Fr. • C • 6-3 • Olate, Kan. (St. Thomas Aquinas HS)

Finished prep career at Saint Thomas Aquinas High School as the all-time leading rebounder in program history while finishing as seventh in program history in scoring... Finished career with 930 points and 689 rebounds... Posted an 81-17 mark during career... Was named team captain as a senior and a finalist for the DiRenna Award, giving to the best player in Kansas City... Averaged 12.2 points and 9.2 rebounds per game as a senior in high school.



45 AICHE NDAO • Sr. • F • 6-3 • Mbour, Senegal (Collin College)

Subject of Big 12 Conference's Champions for Life campaign in 2015-16 from TCU, highlighting her journey from Senegal to the United States despite not going to school for five years while in Senegal, a standard practice for individuals in that nation... Is step-sister of TCU head coach Raegan Pebley after Pebley's parents (Scott family) helped bring Ndao to the United States... Competed in 12 contests with six starts... Averaged 1.7 points and 2.3 rebounds per game.



55 CAROL WILLIE • Jr. • C • 6-2 • Houston, Texas (Cypress Falls HS)

Saw action in 20 contests with two starts last season... Earned first-career start in season-opening win over Houston Baptist, posting two points, three rebounds, an assist and a block... Went 3-of-4 from the free-throw line in TCU's win over SMU on Nov. 19... Tallied four points and four rebounds in nine minutes of action against Texas Southern... Posted two points, two rebounds and a block against No. 5 Texas A&M... Recorded 3 points and 2 boards at Oklahoma on Feb. 14.

WHAT THEY ARE SAYING...

"TCU is a really good team. There are going to be so many team in our league that come in here and do not survive. [TCU] is very hard to guard, and they're going to win a lot of ball games."

"They play a style that's very difficult to defend. It's almost like they never stop moving for the entire game. They're going to push it and think they can outscore you... They shoot the 3-ball extremely well at all positions. While they are not as big as we are, they certainly have guard play that has a lot of depth."

"She sees the floor well and she can penetrate and score. She can shoot the 3 ball. They're playing her a little bit at both the one and the two this year, where as in the past she's been mainly at the point."

I think they are here to stay, but we're not going anywhere either."

GAME NOTES

TALKING POINTS AND NOTABLE STATISTICS

- TCU is in a stretch of six games that will pit the Frogs against four ranked opponents in #17 Oklahoma on Jan. 6, #6 Baylor on Jan. 9, #6 Texas on Jan. 20 and #25 West Virginia on Jan. 24.
- Baylor is the only team in the Big 12 Conference that has faced more ranked opponents than TCU this season.
- Following the West Virginia game, TCU embarks on a three-game road trip against Iowa State, Oklahoma and Oklahoma State. The trio of teams are a combined 26-2 at home this season entering this weekend's games.
- Senior Zahna Medley is one of two players in Big 12 Conference history to score 1,500 points, hit 250 three-point field goals, dish out 400 assists and get 125 or more steals in their career. The only other player to achieve the feat is current Dallas Wings start and former Baylor star Odyssey Sims.
- TCU has held their last three opponents to 65 points or less but are just 1-2 in those games after scoring just 58.7 points per game in those contests. TCU scored at least 69 in their first four games of league play.
- TCU currently has six players averaging at least 8.0 points per game. In program history, TCU's 1999-00 team had six players average at least 8.0 points per game and the program has had nine teams have at least five players average 8.0 points per game or more for a season.
- TCU is in its second season under the leadership of head coach Raegan Pebley. Pebley led TCU to 18 wins in 2014-15, the most wins in a coaches' first-year at TCU in program history.
- Nine players on the TCU roster have at least one career start to their name.
- TCU played seven games in the opening 19 days of the season, including road trips to SMU, Texas A&M and Butler.

SERIES NOTABLES

- West Virginia leads the all-time series 8-1.
- TCU won the most recent meeting between the teams on Feb. 24, 2015 in Fort Worth with the Frogs winning 73-63.

FACING THE RANKED

Head coach Raegan Pebley is 2-8 against ranked opponents since becoming the head coach of the Horned Frogs. The mark includes an 0-4 record against teams in the top five but 2-4 against teams ranked - but outside the top five.

PEBLEY VS. RANKED OPPONENTS AT TCU

RANKINGS LEFTOVERS

- TCU will have faced six ranked teams by the end of January thanks to two games against ranked foes this week. It is the first time in program history that TCU will have played six ranked teams in a season before the month of January ends.
- TCU has faced three different teams ranked in the top 6 nationally this season.
- With a second game against current ranked teams Oklahoma, Texas, Baylor and West Virginia still on the 2015-16 schedule, the Frogs are in line to face a record number of ranked foes in 2015-16. TCU faced 10 ranked foes during the 2005-06 season. It faced nine ranked foes in 2012-13 and 2013-14. TCU has previously faced seven or more ranked foes in 1994-95, 2005-06, 2010-11, 2012-13 and 2013-14.

QUEENS OF THE COMEBACK

TCU has shown a knack for coming from behind to win under head coach Raegan Pebley. TCU posted six wins last season after they overcame a deficit of eight points or more in the contest.

The most notable came in a 86-84 win over Iowa State to help head coach Raegan Pebley record her first career win against a Big 12 opponent. TCU followed that win with another victory over Oklahoma State just three days later, erasing an eight-point deficit to register a 70-66 win.

- TCU has won six conference games over the last two seasons when they faced a deficit of 8 or more during the game.

LOOKING FOR WINS AWAY FROM HOME

TCU was a team that made major progress as a program in 2014-15, but its one downfall was playing on the road. The Horned Frogs were 2-9 on the road and 3-11 away from home last season.

TCU opened its 2015-16 road schedule with a 89-79 win over SMU on Nov. 18, 2015 before nearly beating No. 12/12 Texas A&M on Nov. 21, 2015 in an 82-78 decision. The Frogs matched their road win total from a season ago with their 78-69 win over Texas Tech in Lubbock on Dec. 30, 2015.

Raegen Pebley's past success playing away from home at her previous stops bodes well for expected improvement away from home in the upcoming season. Her squads at Fresno State were a combined 22-14 away from home in two seasons, including a 12-7 mark in 2012-13 and a 10-7 mark in 2013-14.

Senior All-American candidate Zahna Medley has been named one of 30 women's basketball candidates nationwide for the 2015-16 Senior CLASS Award®, it was announced on Tuesday.

Sixty NCAA® men's and women's basketball student-athletes who excel both on and off the court were selected as candidates today for the 2015-16 Senior CLASS Award® in collegiate basketball. To be eligible for the award, a student-athlete must be classified as an NCAA Division I senior and have notable achievements in four areas of excellence: community, classroom, character and competition. The complete list of candidates follows this release.

An acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School®, the Senior CLASS Award focuses on the total student-athlete and encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities.

BOUNCE BACK GAMES

TCU is 4-1 this season in bounce-back games. Bounce-back games are considered the game immediately following a loss. Under head coach Raegen Pebley, the frogs are 14-4 in bounce-back games after posting a 10-3 record in her first season in Fort Worth.

VICTORY ON THE BOARDS

TCU made major strides on the boards in their first

two league games, posting a plus-seven mark at Texas Tech and a plus-12 mark against Kansas State.

TCU's plus-seven advantage on the boards at Texas Tech on Dec. 30, 2015 was the largest for TCU in a Big 12 Conference road game since joining the league prior to the 2012-13 season. It was the first time that TCU had won the rebounding edge in a road contest in league play under Pebley.

FROGS GET AP POLL VOTES

TCU received votes in the Jan. 4, 2016 Associated Press Top 25 rankings, marking the first time since the 2011-12 season that the Frogs have been on a voter's AP ballot and the first time since joining the Big 12 Conference prior to the 2012-13 season.

TCU was last ranked in the Associated Press poll on Nov. 22, 2010 at No. 21 in the nation. All-time, the Horned Frogs have been ranked on 38 occasions with their highest ranking in program history being 13th in the nation.

TCU had two wins over ranked opponent a year ago, defeating 16th ranked Oklahoma and 14th ranked Texas in 2014-15. TCU owns three wins over top five teams in the last seven seasons, including a 2008-09 win over No. 3/5 Maryland, a 2008-09 win over No. 3/3 California and a 2009-10 win over No. 10/5 Texas A&M.

FROGS POST BIGGEST WIN IN LEAGUE PLAY SINCE JOINING BIG 12

TCU's 69-48 win over Texas Tech on Jan. 13, 2016 was its largest since joining the Big 12 Conference in a league game. The 21-point margin surpassed two 20 point efforts from the 2013-14 and 2014-15 seasons against Kansas State.

HOME WINNING STREAK WAS AMONG BEST IN PROGRAM HISTORY

TCU built an impressive home winning streak during a span that covered the end of the 2014-15 season and beginning of the 2015-16 season. The streak ended at 12 games following a setback to No. 3/3 Notre Dame and included six wins to end last season. It was the third longest streak in program history.

SCHOLLMAYER ARENA DEBUT

TCU made its debut in the new Ed and Rae Schollmaier Arena on Dec. 20, 2015, defeating Southern Utah 76-47. It marked the opening of new \$72 million facility that forced the Frogs to play 25 games in the University Recreation Center on campus over the last two seasons.

"THE REC"

TCU spent the 2014-15 season and the first seven home games of the 2015-16 season playing its home games in the University Recreation Center on campus due to the renovation to the Ed and Rae Schollmaier Arena.

The change of venue provided a unique setting for TCU women's basketball last season with the Horned Frogs taking advantage of the small and loud venue.

- TCU finished its time in the Rec Center with a 21-4 record, with the losses coming at the hands of three top five teams and highly touted Oklahoma.
- TCU went 15-3 and averaged 1,414 fans in 2014-15 at home, the figure represented a sold-out season.
- TCU overcame an eight-point deficit to win on five occasions during the 2014-15 season at the University Recreation Center.
- TCU won its first postseason game since 2008 when the Horned Frogs beat Stephen F. Austin on March 19, 2015 while also securing impressive wins over Iowa State, Texas and West Virginia during the regular season.
- TCU beat Iowa State after erasing a 24-point second-half deficit by scoring 65 points in the second 20 minutes of play. The Frogs and Cyclones combined to hit 18 three-point field goals in the game as TCU won 86-84, leading for a total of five seconds the entire game.
- TCU defeated No. 13 Texas on Feb. 1, 2015 to secure just the second win over the Longhorns in program history, including a second straight at home.
- TCU beat No. 16 Oklahoma State on Jan. 10, 2015
- TCU also beat eventual Postseason Women's NIT runner-up West Virginia at home on Feb. 24, 2015.

TCU has scored at least 80 points on six occasions this season.

- TCU scored at least 80 points in each of the first three games of the season. It marked the third time in program history that the Frogs scored at least 80 points in three consecutive games to open a season - reaching the mark in the first four games of the 1992-93 season and in the first three games of the 2010-11 season previously.

RAMIREZ NAMED ALL-USA BY USA TODAY

TCU signee Amber Ramirez has been named to the American Family Insurance ALL-USA Preseason Girls Basketball Team by USA Today, it was announced on Nov. 19. Ramirez is one of 20 players selected by USA TODAY Sports' Jim Halley in consultation with various recruiting analysts and high school coaches to the team.

Ramirez is one of the top-ranked individual recruits in TCU history. She ranks as the 13th best player in the nation by ESPN HoopGurlz and is one of just 21 players in the nation to grade out with a 98 rating in ESPN's player ratings. She ranks second nationally at her position and 11th overall in the nation by ProspectsNation.com.

Ramirez is the second highest ranked individual player that the program has ever signed behind recent TCU Letterman's Association Hall of Fame selection Sandora Irvin, who arrived at TCU prior to the 2001-02 season ranked sixth nationally in the 2000-01 Blue Star Report. Irvin

currently ranks as the all-time leading scorer in program history and spent time in the WNBA.

TICKET TO RIDE

TCU and Texas Tech faced some unique challenges in making sure their game on Dec. 30, 2015 could be played and that all players were present for it.

The Frogs normally bus for the approximately 300 mile trek to Lubbock, but were forced to take a charter plane instead as conditions in the Lubbock area prevented bus travel. The Frogs also had an extra passenger for their trip when Texas Tech's Zuri Sanders joined TCU on the plane from the DFW area after being stranded in Dallas returning from holiday travels from her hometown of Evansville, Ind.

DEFENSE TAMES NEW ORLEANS

TCU put together an impressive defensive effort against New Orleans on Nov. 15, 2015 at the University Recreation Center that will be included in the TCU record book for years to come.

- TCU held New Orleans to 12 points in the first half, marking the 10th time in school history that the Frogs held an opponent to 12 points or less in the first half of a game.
- TCU held an opponent under 40 points in a game for the first time since Dec. 22, 2012 when the Horned Frogs held UT Pan American to just 37 points.
- The 36 points scored by New Orleans were tied for the 11th fewest allowed by the Horned Frogs in a game in program history. It was the first time a team was held to 36 points or less since Air Force had 31 on Feb. 22, 2012.
- The 20.0 percent shooting by New Orleans tied for the seventh best defensive effort in program history for the Horned Frogs. It was the eighth time in TCU history that a team has held its opponent to 20.0 percent shooting or less.

MOST WINS BY FIRST YEAR HEAD COACH

Head coach Raegan Pebley led TCU to 18 wins in her inaugural season in Fort Worth, marking the most wins by a first-year head coach in program history at TCU. It is a record she is familiar with as she tied a similar mark at Fresno State during the 2012-13 season when she led the Bulldogs to a 24-9 record and an appearance in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

TCU was last ranked in the Associated Press poll on Nov. 22, 2010 at No. 21 in the nation. All-time, the Horned Frogs have been ranked on 38 occasions with their highest ranking in program history being 13th in the nation.

- TCU owns three wins over top five teams in the last seven seasons, including a 2008-09 win over No. 3/5 Maryland, a 2008-09 win over No. 3/3 California and a 2009-10 win over No. 10/5 Texas A&M.

STATISTICAL LEFTOVERS

- TCU has hit at least 10 three-point field goals in a game on 10 occasions during the Raegan Pebley era.
- TCU'S 56 rebounds against Prairie View A&M were the most for the Horned Frogs since posting 56 against UT Arlington on Dec. 8, 2010.
- Butler's Belle Obert recorded a triple-double against the Frogs on Dec. 1, 2015 with 12 points, 11 rebounds and 10 blocks. The 10 blocks shattered the TCU opponent record as no player had ever had more than seven blocks against the Frogs in program history.

FROGS POST POSITIVE START

TCU's 7-2 start to the season was among the best in program history. TCU was 7-2 or better to open the season for the ninth time in TCU history. The 7-2 start for the Horned Frogs was tied for the third best start through nine games in program history, surpassed only by 8-1 efforts to

open the 1997-98 and 2003-04 seasons.

FROGS OPENED SEASON WITH THREE STRAIGHT WINS

TCU opened the season with three consecutive wins, tying for the fifth best start in program history and just the seventh time in TCU history that the Horned Frogs started a season 3-0.

- The 3-0 start for Pebley's current Horned Frogs tied the 3-0 start for her 2009-10 team at Utah State for the best start to begin a season during her career.

TCU AND SEASON OPENERS

TCU is 23-16 in season openers, including wins in seven of the last nine season openers. The Frogs beat Sam Houston State 85-59 in this year's season opener on Nov. 13, 2015.

TCU AND OPENING THE SEASON AT HOME

TCU is 18-6 in program history when opening a season at home, including a 87-64 win last year over Houston Baptist to open the Raegan Pebley era and an 85-59 win over Sam Houston State this season.

TCU AND THE POSTSEASON

TCU has reached the postseason in 13 of the last 15 seasons. The 13 appearances are the fourth most in that span among Big 12 programs, trailing only Baylor (15), Oklahoma (15) and Iowa State (14).

The Horned Frogs earned their first-ever postseason bid in 2001 and has made nine trips to the NCAA Tournament, advancing to the second round in 2001, 2002, 2003, 2004 and 2006. The program has a 5-9 record in the NCAA Tournament.

PROGRAM OF YOUNG SUCCESS

TCU's women's basketball program has enjoyed a history of young success - earning its share of success since the turn of the millennium.

- TCU made its first postseason appearance in program history in 2000-01 and have made nine NCAA tournament trips in total.
- The Horned Frogs won an NCAA Tournament game in four consecutive years from 2001 through 2004, but have found the wins column just once since, a 2006 win in the opening round of the tournament.
- TCU was one of eight teams in the Big 12 Conference to reach the postseason in 2014-15.

PEBLEY AND THE POSTSEASON

Head coach Raegan Pebley has led her squad to the postseason in each of the last five seasons, including two NCAA Tournament bids at Fresno State in 2013 and 2014 and a Postseason Women's NIT bid for TCU in 2015. The

PEBLEY AND DEFENSIVE POY

With departed senior Chelsea Prince's selection as the Big 12 Conference's Defensive Player of the Year honor in 2014-15, head coach Raegan Pebley tutored a league's defensive player of the year for her fourth consecutive season.

Pebley had consecutive players at Fresno State take home the Mountain West Conference's top defensive honor in Taylor Thompson (2013-14) and Ki-ki Moore (2012-13) while Ashlee Brown (2011-12) took home the honors in the WAC in Pebley's final season at Utah State.

Prince joined Sandora Irvin as the only other player in program history to take home defensive player of the year honors at TCU. Prince led the Big 12 Conference in steals last season, setting a new TCU single-season record and finishing in the top three on TCU's career list.

STAFF ADDITIONS

TCU added one assistant coach and a video coordinator to the staff this summer, adding veteran coach Aaron Kallhoff and recent Texas A&M alum Rodney Hill to the Frog Family.

Kallhoff arrived at TCU after spending the last two seasons at Arkansas State where he helped lead the Red Wolves to 46 wins, including their first postseason victory since 2007 this past season. Arkansas State tallied the second-most wins in program history during the 2014-15 season with 24 and went a combined 30-8 in Sun Belt Conference play over two years.

Hill served as an assistant coach at Urbana University during the 2014-15 season before joining the Horned Frogs this summer.

NEWCOMERS

TCU welcomes seven new faces to the court for the 2015-16 season, with four freshmen and three transfers - including two transfers eligible for the 2015-16 season.

The trio of transfers bring playing experience from the Pac-12 Conference, Southeastern Conference and American Athletic Conference to the TCU roster. Sophomore Toree Thompson and graduate transfer Destynnee Hives-McCray can take the floor this season while USC transfer Amy Okonkwo, also a sophomore, is eligible to take the floor in 2016-17.

I think Aiche's dad saw something extra special in her and asked my dad to help provide his daughter with an opportunity."

Ndao has already earned an associate's degree and will soon complete a bachelor's degree from TCU.

ANTONELLI VISITS TCU

TV analyst and women's basketball ambassador Debbie Antonelli visited TCU on Sept. 29, 2015 for a media training and team-bonding session. Antonelli's unique sessions give players a real look at the women's basketball world and their responsibility to grow the game.

As a player, marketing executive and broadcaster, Antonelli has been a major influencer in the women's college basketball circles and has served as an analyst for ESPN, including games on SEC Network and Longhorn Network. Her 27-year announcing career also includes games for CBS, Fox Sports Net, Big Ten Network, NBATV, Westwood One, in addition to being an analyst for the Indiana Fever since the WNBA started in 1997.

The recipient of the 2007 Mel Greenberg Award given by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) to the professional who has best displayed commitment to advancing the role of the media in promoting women's basketball, Antonelli is also the voice of the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame and a longtime member of the Board of Directors. She is a lifetime member of the Kay Yow Cancer Fund Board of Directors, selected by Coach Yow to carry out her vision for the fund.

PEBLEY JOINS KAY YOW CANCER FUND BOARD, #PLAY4KAY GAME SET FOR FEB. 13

TCU head coach Raegan Pebley joined the board of the Kay Yow Cancer Fund in the fall of 2015. The Kay Yow Cancer Fund was officially founded on Dec. 3, 2007, from the vision of the organization's namesake Kay Yow, former NC State University head women's basketball coach.

Coach Yow was first diagnosed with breast cancer in 1987 before succumbing to the disease on Jan. 24, 2009. The Kay Yow Cancer Fund is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization committed to being a part of finding an answer in the fight against women's cancers through raising funds for scientific research, assisting the underserved, and unifying people for a common cause.

RULES CHANGES

Several rule changes will make a major impact on the game of women's basketball in 2015-16, including the move to four 10-minute quarters and changes in the structure of fouls.

2015-17 NCAA WOMEN'S BASKETBALL RULE CHANGES

- Periods - Length. (Rule 5-6.1). Playing time for varsity games shall consist of four ten-minute periods. The intermission between the first and second and the third and fourth periods shall be 75 seconds in a non-media game or 75 seconds or the length of the electronic-media timeout in a media game.
- Timeouts Granted and Charged - Option to Advance the Ball (Rule 5-14.2). When a timeout is charged to the offensive team during the last 59.9 seconds of the fourth period and/

or any extra period(s), the team has the option to advance the throw-in spot to the 28-foot mark in the front court on the same side of the court as the scorers' table.

- Timeouts Granted and Charged - Media Timeout Format. (Rule 5-14.10). In games using electronic-media timeouts, each team will have three 30-second timeouts and 1 full timeout (60 seconds in length). There is one electronic-media timeout in each period. The break between the first and second, as well as between the third and fourth periods, may be used as an electronic-media timeout. The first team-called timeout in the second half will become an electronic-media timeout.
- Timeouts Granted and Charged - Bands/Amplified Music. (Rule 5-14.17). Bands and/or amplified music may be played during any dead ball period.
- Timeouts Not Granted - Monitor Review. (Rule 5-15.1.f). Timeouts are not to be granted when there is an instant replay review in the last two minutes of the game until the results of the review have been reported to both head coaches.
- Bonus Free Throws. (Rule 8-2.1). A team is awarded two free throws for each common foul beginning with the fifth team foul in a period.
- Violation - 10-Second Back Court. (Rule 9-11). The 10-second count shall reset on all stoppages of the game clock except when the defense causes the ball to be out of bounds, the offense retains possession after a held ball, or there is a technical foul assessed to the offensive team.
- Officiating Guidelines - Displacement. (Appendix III, Section 3). When an offensive post player with her back to the basket in the lane area is in control of the ball, a post defender may only place one forearm or one hand with a bend in the elbow on the offensive player.

IRVIN JOINS TCU LETTERMAN'S HALL OF FAME

TCU women's basketball great Sandora Irvin was inducted into the TCU Letterman's Association Hall of Fame earlier this year.

She joined the hall of fame alongside Roosevelt Collins, Luis Ruelle, Roscoe Tatum, Gregg Troy and Royal West. She became the second TCU women's basketball letterwinner to join the group.

Irvin was inducted in a formal ceremony and banquet on Sept. 17, 2015. One of the most decorated student-athletes in TCU history, Irvin was a two-time All-America honoree by the WBCA and AP, who was selected as the No. 3 overall pick in the 2005 WNBA Draft. Irvin, who previously held the NCAA record for blocked shots in a career, is TCU's all-time leader in points, rebounding and blocked shots. She was named to the Conference USA All-Decade team and was voted the league's Female Athlete of the Year in 2005.

BIG 12/SEC CHALLENGE COMING IN 2016, 2017

TCU will take the floor against LSU and Alabama in the upcoming seasons as part of an expanded Big 12/SEC Challenge. The competition has been expanded to 10 games for 2016-17 and 2017-18. Every team from the Big 12 will participate while 10 teams from the SEC will take part in each season. The format features five home games on campus sites for each conference per year. Teams will not face the same opponent twice. In 2016, games will be scheduled over the dates of Thursday-Sunday, December 1-4.

The inaugural challenge was held in 2014 in Little Rock, Ark., and featured a top 5 matchup with No. 3 Texas squaring off against No. 4 Texas A&M. Oklahoma and Arkansas, who were both receiving votes in the Associated Press Poll, played in the second game. The conferences split the Challenge with the two games decided by a total of nine points.

The 2015 version was contested in Oklahoma City on Sunday, Dec. 20, 2015, with the opponents reversed. Texas faced Arkansas while Oklahoma faced Texas A&M.

- By facing Texas A&M this season in College Station, Texas, and having SEC foes on the slate in 2016-17 and 2017-18, the Frogs are guaranteed to have a streak of four straight years facing an SEC foe. TCU lost in Athens, Ga., to Georgia last season.

With a noted history for taking programs to unseen levels, Raegan Pebley enters her second year as the head coach of the TCU Horned Frogs and her 13th season as a head coach. A former national coach of the year finalist, Pebley led TCU to an 18-14 mark in her first season in Fort Worth, posting the most wins in program history by a first-year head coach and leading the team to the postseason in her inaugural season at TCU.

Behind an uptempo offense and aggressive defense, the Frogs registered a program-best nine Big 12 victories to earn the No. 3 seed at the Big 12 Championships, surpassing the previous best regular-season finish of seventh. TCU also picked up its first-ever wins in Lawrence against Kansas and in Stillwater against Oklahoma State and claimed its first three-game winning streak in Big 12 Conference play.

Pebley was officially hired April 1, 2014.

Pebley (pronounced Pee-blee), regarded as one of the top up-and-coming coaches in the country,

came to TCU after spending the previous two seasons at Fresno State, where she led the Bulldogs to Mountain West Conference Tournament titles and berths into the NCAA Tournament in her two seasons at the school.

Fresno State compiled a 46-20 (.697) overall record under the direction of Pebley, including a 26-8 (.765) mark in league play, while four Bulldogs earned All-Mountain West honors, including back-to-back Defensive Player of the Year selections.

The Orem, Utah, native faced a tall task in her first head coaching position, starting the Utah State women's basketball program after its reinstatement in 2003 following a 25-year hiatus.

Pebley led the Aggies for nine seasons, building the program from scratch into back-to-back WNIT berths, marking the first postseason appearances in school history.

Pebley ranks as one of the most successful coaches in Mountain West Conference history. Her .765 record in league games ranks second all-time in

conference history.

A standout at the University of Colorado, Pebley was selected with the 21st overall pick of the 1997 WNBA Draft, where she played two seasons with the Cleveland Rockers and Utah Starzz.

During her collegiate career at Colorado, Pebley helped lead the Buffs to a 106-24 overall record and four conference championships while earning all-conference accolades twice. CU earned two Sweet 16 appearances during her career, including a trip to the Elite Eight during her sophomore season, as the Buffs won a school-record 30 games (30-3 overall). Colorado had won 25 straight games that season and finished the year ranked No. 2 in the final AP poll.

Pebley and her husband, Keith, have one son, Joseph, and one daughter, Harper.

The inaugural game in the Ed and Rae Schollmaier Arena was held on Dec. 20, 2015. Previously known as Daniel-Meyer Coliseum, the facility underwent a \$72 million renovation. The Schollmaiers provided the lead gift. The Daniel-Meyer name will remain prominent as the entire area will be known as the Daniel-Meyer Athletic Complex.

The interior has a lower playing surface to increase courtside seating and provide a more intimate atmosphere. Wider concourses and multiple public entries will ease congestion. The fan experience will be further enhanced by new concession stands, a food court and restrooms as well as increased points of sale. A new courtside club lounge will be located on floor level. The facility also includes offices for the athletics administrative staff as well as coaches in various sports, allowing the Ed and Rae Schollmaier Arena to be the hub of TCU Athletics.

Additional features of the Ed and Rae Schollmaier Arena are a TCU Athletics Hall of Fame on the concourse level, offices for Olympic sports and administration and a larger main ticket office to support both the arena and Amon G. Carter Stadium.

RECAP

DALLAS, Texas – TCU led by as many as 24 points and coasted to an 89-79 win over SMU on Wednesday night to improve to 3-0 for the first time since the 2010-11 season.

Senior All-American candidate Zahna Medley scored 15 of her team-high 17 points in the first half to lead five TCU players that reached double figures.

TCU (3-0) built a 24-point lead in the second half at 67-43 en route to posting its second consecutive double-digit win over their cross-town rival. The Frogs shot 47.9 percent and hit 8-of-15 from behind the three-point arc.

TCU trailed 4-2 in the early going before pushing the pace with their press with a 6-0 run that included two baskets from Medley. The senior guard scored 10 of TCU's first 18 points to put the Frogs up 18-12. The lead expanded to double-digits late in the first quarter for the first time in the game at 22-12.

After the Mustangs cut the TCU lead to five at 31-26 with 8:29 left in the second quarter, TCU went on a 24-9 run to end the half to take the 20-point lead into the break. During the run to end the half, the Frogs hit nine of their final 10 shots.

The Frogs had the hot hand in the first half, hitting 55 percent of their shots including 6-of-8 from behind the three-point arc. The TCU advantage was also made thanks to a quality effort on the boards, outrebounding the Mustangs 24-13 in the first half for a 15-5 advantage in second chance points.

The Frogs finished the game with a 40-36 edge on the boards and forced 21 Mustang turnovers in the win.

NOTES

- TCU has won two straight and 11 of the last 16 in the series against SMU. It's the first back-to-back wins in the series for the Frogs since winning consecutive games in 2009-10 and 2010-11.
- TCU's 89 points were the second most ever scored by the Frogs against SMU behind the 125 scored in a 127-125 loss to the Mustangs in four overtimes on Jan. 25, 1997.
- TCU's 55 points in the first half marked the seventh most that the Frogs have scored in the first half of a game in program history. It was the most for a TCU team since scoring 56 in the first half against Sam Houston State on Nov. 16, 2010.
- Hives-McCray was making her return to Dallas and SMU, where she spent four years with the Mustang, before transferring to TCU to use her final year of playing eligibility.

COLLEGE STATION, Texas – TCU sophomore AJ Alix had a game-high 24 points to pace the Horned Frogs in an 82-78 setback at Reed Arena to No. 12/12 Texas A&M on Saturday afternoon. The Frogs led for over 32 minutes of the contest before the Aggies were able to push ahead in the final minutes.

TCU (3-1, 0-0) led by as many as 11 points in the game and held a two-point edge with 3:08 left before a pair of Aggie free throws tied a game that eventually went in favor of Texas A&M. The in-state matchup featured nine lead changes and six ties.

"(It was) just a great atmosphere. Really great crowd," said head coach Raegen Pebley. "I think that was a big factor for A&M in the second half, especially towards the end. I'm proud of our team and the effort they played with and the intensity in the way they prepared and the confidence they came into this game with. Obviously, we wanted to see this turn out another way and get a win, but when it came down to it at the very end, we didn't execute well enough and close games like this go to the teams that rebound better and execute better."

Alix's career high saw the Houston native hit six three-point field goals in the game. Senior Veja Hamilton added 12 points while sophomore Toree Thompson added a career best 16 points while hitting 4-of-4 from behind the three-point arc.

Texas A&M (4-0, 0-0) took advantage of 14-of-20 free throw shooting in the game and built a 39-33 advantage on the boards in the victory while shooting 51.5 percent in the second half.

TCU and Texas A&M battled early as the teams exchanged leads early. The Frogs finally took control late in the first quarter thanks to an 11-0 run to end the quarter. Trailing 16-14 after an Aggie basket with 2:56 to go in the first quarter, Toree Thompson knocked down a three with 2:30 to go followed by another three from AJ Alix with 1:47 to go. Alix followed with another basket with 33 seconds remaining in the first quarter before the Frogs forced a backcourt violation following an Aggie timeout. Thompson nailed a three from the corner to close out the quarter and put TCU up 25-16.

The lead expanded early in the second quarter as the run expanded to 13-0 thanks to a basket from Hamilton.

The Aggie fought back with an 8-0 run of their own to close the gap to 27-24 before Hamilton ended a 4:32 drought for the Frogs with a basket. The Aggies then hit another basket before Alix answered with a three from the top of the key off a screen to go up 32-26.

The Frogs then scored seven straight to extend the lead back to double-digits at 43-32 before the Aggies scored the final five of the half to give TCU a 43-37 edge at halftime. TCU shot 6-of-10 from behind the three-point arc in the first half, including 4-of-4 from Alix and 2-of-2 from Thompson.

Texas A&M fought back early in the third, scoring six straight to cut it to one at 46-45 and again at 48-47 before Alix knocked down a three from the top of the key with 6:18 to go in the quarter. Thompson then added a three out of a media timeout to extend that lead to 54-47.

The Aggies fought back in the fourth with nine straight points after TCU had jumped ahead 67-59 on a pair of early quarter threes by Alix and Thompson. The 9-0 spurt gave the Aggies their first lead since 10-9.

Butts answered the Aggie advantage with a three from the top of the key followed by a basket from Hives-McCray with 5:12 to go to extend the lead back to four at 72-68. The Aggies tied the game again at 74-74 before a basket from Courtney Walker put the Texas A&M up 76-74 with 2:35 to go. Medley again tied it with a pair of free throws with 2:16 remaining.

Chelsea Jennings got a layup with 1:55 left and Jordan Jones added one with 1:04 remaining to give the Aggies a 80-76 advantage. Alix's basket with 34.6 left cut the lead to two at 80-78 but the Aggies scored again with six seconds left to put the game out of reach in the final seconds.

TCU senior All-American candidate Zahna Medley continued to draw a crowd on the defensive end, allowing her teammates to do much of the scoring in the game. Medley took just eight shots and finished with six points and three assists in 28 minutes.

"She helps us more ways than scoring," said Pebley. "She's really bought into being a better defender. She's a tremendous leader. She's really grown into a great locker room leader for our team."

Texas A&M had three players in double figures as Walker (23), Williams (17) and Jones (17) placed the Aggies.

LUBBOCK, Texas - TCU overcame a 15-point second half deficit to post a 78-69 win over Texas Tech on the road and open league play with a victory for the first time as a member of the Big 12 Conference.

TCU (9-3, 1-0) used a 15-0 run near the start of the fourth quarter to erase a Lady Raider deficit for good and help TCU build a 69-59 lead following a three by Toree Thompson.

Texas Tech scored eight of the first 11 points out of the gate in the second half and eventually built a 15-point lead at 54-39 with 4:24 to go in the third quarter.

The Frogs responded with baskets from Caitlin Diaz, Jada Butts and Toree Thompson to but the lead back to single-digits at 54-45. Thompson added a pair of free throws before Destyne Hives-McCray's basket in transition extended the TCU run to 10-0 and cut the lead to five at 54-49.

Texas Tech ended the run with a pair of free throw with 2:05 to go in the third quarter but the free throw line was the Lady Raiders' only form of offense for the second half of the third period as they missed their final seven shots and failed to make a field goal after hitting a shot with 5:12 to go in the period.

Thompson knocked down a three to open the fourth quarter to pull within 57-54 before Texas Tech hit a field goal. AJ Alix then knocked down a three to pull within 59-57 with 8:19 to go. The Alix three ignited a 15-0 run that saw TCU retake the lead, its first since 2-0 in the opening minute of the game. The lead got to 10 at 69-59 before Texas Tech got a basket with just over four minutes to go. Alix added another three to extend the lead to 72-61 with just under three minutes remaining.

Texas Tech fought and cut it to three at 72-69 with 40.3 left before TCU secured the win.

TCU won in Lubbock for just the third time in school history. The Horned Frogs, picked to finish fifth in the Big 12 Conference in a survey of league's head coaches, are tied for first following the opening night of the season.

RECAP

FORT WORTH, Texas - TCU improved to 2-0 in Big 12 Conference play for the first time as a member of the league thanks to a 87-73 win over Kansas State on Saturday afternoon at the Ed and Rae Schollmaier Arena.

TCU (10-3, 2-0) set a new school record for points in a Big 12 Conference game with 87 and gradually pulled away from the Wildcats thanks to an 11-of-22 shooting effort from behind the three-point arc. Senior All-American candidate Zahna Medley led the way with 27 points, hitting five three-point field goals, dishing out four assists, three rebounds and three steals.

With Big 12 Conference play starting, Medley is also starting to make a major dent in the Big 12 Conference record books. Her efforts on Saturday moved her into the top 10 in career three-point field goals made and into the top 35 in career scoring in Big 12 Conference history.

After falling behind 5-0 in the opening minutes after hitting 0-of-4 from the field to open, the Frogs hit their next four field goals and used a 6-0 spurt to jump ahead 12-8 thanks to a Medley three. The Frogs eventually built an 8-point lead in the first quarter at 20-12 as senior Veja Hamilton scored 10 of TCU's first 10 points. The lead grew to as many as 13 before the halftime break until Kansas State knocked down a pair of three-point field goals in the final 1:03 of the first half to trim the lead to 37-30.

The Frogs scored the first five out of the break to extend the lead to 12. Neither team scored more than five straight points the remainder of the third quarter until TCU's AJ Alix and Toree Thompson knocked down three's in the final 40 seconds of the period to extend the lead to 13 at 64-51. Jada Butts added a free throw and Alix hit another three to open the third quarter to extend the lead to 17 at 68-51 following a 10-0 run.

Kansas State (10-3, 0-2) answered with an 11-1 run of their own to trim the lead to eight at 70-62 before Medley knocked down another three. The Wildcats got within seven at 73-66 and four at 75-71 before the Frogs closed on a 10-2 run, including six free throws from Medley in the final 1:09.

NOTES

- TCU's 87 points were its most scored in a Big 12 Conference game in program history, surpassing the 86 scored against Iowa State on Jan. 7, 2015.
It is the first time in TCU history that the Frogs have started Big 12 Conference play with a perfect 2-0 record.
TCU owns its first 10-3 start since the 2009-10 season when the Frogs opened 12-3.

MANHATTAN, Kan. – TCU couldn't overcome a poor shooting night in Manhattan as the Frogs fell 58-49 to Kansas State on Saturday evening on the road.

Kansas State (12-5, 2-4) held TCU to just 28.3 percent shooting from the field, the lowest output of the season for TCU.

Kansas State limited the TCU offense early as the Frogs fell behind 8-2 as it made just 1-of-9 shots to open the game and committed four early turnovers before Carol Willie's basket with 3:02 remaining in the first quarter. After cutting the lead to three at 17-14 on a basket by Veja Hamilton with 6:59 left in second quarter, the Frogs again went cold. TCU missed its final 10 shots of the half as Kansas State scored the final 10 points of the half.

TCU's 10 first half turnovers, paired with their 21.4 percent shooting effort in the opening half proved costly in holding a 13-point deficit at the break at 27-14.

Kansas State's Megan Denies got a steal out of the halftime break and extended the lead to 15 points at 29-14 before the Frogs began to inch back into the game. AJ Alix starred in the third quarter with a trio of three-point field goals as TCU eventually cut it to eight at 44-37 after scoring the final four of the third quarter in the final 5.1 seconds.

The deficit eventually went to three at 48-45 thanks to a three-point play by Jordan Moore and a floater from Alix. Kansas State's Breanna Lewis answered with four straight and the Frogs were never able to get the deficit lower than five the rest of the way.

TCU (11-6, 3-3) had just one player in double figures as Alix had 13 points. Senior Zahna Medley added eight points, seven rebounds and four assists.

FORT WORTH, Texas – No. 6/6 Texas overcame an 8-point second half deficit to escape with an 65-58 win over TCU on Wednesday evening in Ed and Rae Schollmaier Arena.

TCU (11-7, 3-4) led by as many as eight in the second half at 41-33 midway through the third quarter and led by as many as 11 points in the first half. Texas used a 6-0 run late in the third quarter to cut the Horned Frog lead to one and eventually took their first lead since the game's opening minutes at 53-52 with 5:08 left on a free throw from Brianna Taylor.

Texas grew their lead to five at 59-54 before Toree Thompson cut the margin to two with a step-back three-point field goal with 2:14 left but the Frogs got no closer the rest of the way.

TCU missed its final five shots, 1-of-7 and 2-of-9 shots to end the game.

No. 6/6 Texas (17-1, 6-1) avoided their third straight loss in Fort Worth after the Frogs won home games against the Longhorns in 2013-14 and 2014-15 before tonight's setback.

TCU's AJ Alix and Zahna Medley each had 12 points to lead the Horned Frogs. Medley also made a notable accomplishment in the game against the Longhorns, passing TCU assistant and Texas legend Edwina Brown on the Big 12's career scoring list. Medley, who ranks fourth in TCU history in career points, now has 1,715 career points.

Despite a notable size advantage in the post for Texas, TCU outrebounded the Longhorns 37-35 in the game and allowed just five second chance points in the game off nine offensive rebounds.

TCU women give thumbs-up in switch to four quarters after exhibition win

For the four freshmen who saw their first collegiate playing time in TCU women's basketball's 88-49 exhibition win over Texas Wesleyan on Sunday, there was a learning curve.

However, they might have held a slight advantage over the more veteran players.

Over the off-season, the NCAA moved women's basketball to four 10-minute quarters instead of two 20-minute halves. The change was no different for those who just completed four years of high school ball, which is played under a four-quarter system.

Sunday was the first trial run of the new format, which TCU coach Raegan Pebley said her team handled well.

"It was good," she said. "It kind of feels like just a time out in between those quarters. I love it. I think it's a faster-paced game."

While the fans might enjoy less of a time hit to their daily schedule, the players said it felt like they were mentally in a longer game.

"I felt like with the 10-minute quarters it just seems like you have more game that you're playing even though it's the same amount of time," senior guard Veja Hamilton said. "Breaking it up like that gives us more time to slow things down and catch our breath."

The new format changes the number of fouls needed to reach the bonus to five each quarter, instead of earning a chance at 1-and-1 at seven fouls and a double-bonus at 10.

Also, with under a minute in the fourth quarter, a timeout allows a team to advance the ball in certain situations, similar to the NBA.

Pebley utilized the warmup game to give her entire roster playing time, which resulted in a balanced offense, and the result was depth in offense.

Four players finished with double-digit point totals, led by senior guard Zahna Medley with 19. All but three of the 13 who played scored.

"Coach P believes that with this position-less offense that when we run, we can average four players in double figures at all times," senior transfer Destynnee Hives-McCray said. "As long as we trust the system and do what we practice and pursue the ball and knock down shots, I feel like we can have this consistently."

Hives-McCray, an Arlington Martin alumnus, made a noticeable impact to the TCU roster in her first action as a Horned Frog, scoring 11 points and pulling down a team-high eight rebounds.

The graduate transfer came to TCU for her final year of eligibility after playing three seasons at SMU. Last season, she finished second on the Mustangs in scoring, averaging 9.9 points per game and posing double-digit scoring numbers 15 times.

"She's definitely in a leadership role, having someone who has done it for four years and been the best player on a team definitely contributes to our team," Hamilton. "It gives us a lot more to look forward to. We know that if we're struggling we can talk to her about it and she helps us out."

Medley looks to end collegiate journey on a high note

Frog's leap: TCU plans to build upon last year's success

A new season awaits the Horned Frogs, who still have the taste of the Women's National Invitational Tournament lingering about.

Making history is an understatement.

TCU finished third last season in the Big 12 Conference making them just one of four conference programs to reach the postseason in 13 of the last 15 seasons alongside Baylor, Oklahoma, and Iowa State.

To top that off, the sweetest victory over Stephen F. Austin in the opening round of the Women's NIT was the first postseason win since 2008. The postseason momentum ended in a down to the wire overtime loss against Southern Miss 77-73.

"I think you have to plan for success. We're really process driven here...we don't focus on an end goal; we don't focus on an uncontrollable thing. We just focus on everyday -- get better," says head coach Raegan Pebley.

The first year coach has a history of rebuilding programs and launching them into the postseason. Pebley led Fresno State to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances in 2013-14 and helped grow Utah State into a winning program.

During her first year with the Horned Frogs, Pebley is the only coach in program history to reach the postseason in year one and has the most wins by a first-year coach.

It's evident what Pebley can and will do for this program. All we have to do is sit back and

watch the magic happen.

With players like forward Chelsea Prince and guard Natalie Ventress, now out of the picture, this team has been rebuilding all summer long.

TCU welcomes seven new faces to the court for the 2015-16 season four of which are freshmen and three transfers. The trio of transfers are forward Destynnee Hives-McCray from SMU, Amy Okonkwo from USC, and Toree Thompson from Ole Miss. Each new addition brings crucial elements such as size and power, that will truly make a difference down the stretch.

However, a new team calls for new challenges.

"They haven't hit fatigue which is where people can get irritated with each other. But I just feel right now what they've based their chemistry on is going to sustain us through those dog days of the season. And they based their chemistry on... having an unconditional collective commitment of being our best," said Pebley.

TCU returns three starters and nine letter winners from last season's 18-14 squad. Two of those starters, All-American Zahna Medley, and All-Conference candidate Veja Hamilton, welcome the new faces with open arms and embrace what each player has to offer to the team.

"We have bigger size, so that means bigger and better rebounders which we struggled with last season...they will help us out a lot," said Medley.

The two-time All-Conference candidate looks to have a breakout senior year to cap off last season's exhilarating run. Medley led TCU in scoring averaging 15.6 points per game and is among the nation's top scorers with nearly 1,500 points on the board. The Springfield native also set the single-season record in free-throw percentage.

Hamilton is also motivated to end her career with the Horned Frogs on a high note. Right behind Medley, Hamilton was the second leading scorer with 11.3 points and 4.5 rebounds per game.

Medley and Hamilton, plus the new size and strength additions down in the paint, equals a new and improved level of competitiveness for TCU women's basketball. The goal is still the same: get back to the championship and win.

Speaking of competitiveness, just take a look at their schedule. Eight of ten teams in the Big 12 conference reached the postseason last year. And let's not forget the Horned Frogs will face a physical Texas A&M and Notre Dame.

However, the preparation is the same according to Pebley.

"We have to be consistent in how we prepare. We can't be focused on the other teams uniform or the scoreboard. We have to be focused on [the] next play, next possession..."

"We're going to focus on this non-conference period...one game at a time," said Coach Pebley.

If Pebley could coach this team into winning their first postseason game since 2008 in year one, then just imagine what will unfold this season. The Horned Frogs are on the hunt to get back to the Women's NIT and win it all.

"We definitely have to play well in the pre-season. I think that was kind of one of the factors that determined where we ended up in the postseason. I think it's just about consistency throughout the year...we raised our level of play towards the end when we should've had it from the beginning," said Hamilton.

"Starting off strong, maintaining confidence and intensity, and just knowing how to finish games. We struggled with that a little bit last season...finishing meaningful games we should win by double digits," said Medley.

The formula for a repeat of postseason success is brewing at TCU. And with the debut of the Ed and Rae Schollmaier Arena this season featuring

\$72 million in renovations, the ladies in purple and white gear up for yet another exciting season in a state-of-the-art facility.

The Horned Frogs open the regular season against Sam Houston State at home Friday, November 13 and will open conference play Wednesday, December 30 in Lubbock against Texas Tech.

Get ready to clean your ears ladies and gentlemen; TCU women's basketball is ready to make some noise this season.

TCU women's basketball sports new look with added post presence

The TCU women's basketball team enters this season with a full year of coach Raegan Pebley's system under its belt.

It's a system marked by up-tempo play, including a full-court press that leads to points in transition.

As the Horned Frogs reached conference play last season, that aspect of the system took hold with a smaller lineup that saw five guards on the floor at times, leading to a program-best third-place finish in the Big 12.

Some of that momentum carries over with the return of senior scoring leaders Zahna Medley, a preseason all-Big 12 selection, and Veja Hamilton, a preseason all-Big 12 honorable mention pick.

"We still have scorers," Medley said. "Veja and I are still here and we were the top leading scorers the past seasons, so I feel like our presence is still there. We're just gaining defense and rebounding, so I feel, if anything, we're going to be better than last year."

Even with what TCU returns, it will look like a different team. The Frogs will no longer be forced into a five-guard lineup with the addition of two post players.

Medley's experience as a four-year starter will be especially valuable to a pair of freshmen who will be called into action from Day One: center Jordan Moore and forward Adeola Akomolafe.

Both standing at 6-foot-3, the two fill a void that plagued TCU last season: the ability to defend and rebound against the height in the Big 12.

TCU's biggest off-season acquisition came from SMU. Graduate transfer Destyne Hives-McCray brings four years of experience and a physical presence inside the perimeter.

Hives-McCray played in 28 games last year for SMU as a junior, finishing second on the team in scoring at 9.9 points per game. She led the team in shooting percentage at 47.4 percent and had a team-high six double-doubles.

"Destyne has that experience that the other newcomers don't have," Pebley said. "She understands pace of play and physicality and just a mentality that you have to embrace."

In its first year under Pebley, TCU barely missed an NCAA Tournament bid, but advanced to the second round of the WNIT. Earning that tournament bid is the goal this season.

"I feel like I've been here forever, but it's been a fun forever and I really enjoy this program and this school," said Medley, who is 456 points from the school record in career points. "It's a great school and I kind of don't want to graduate because I'm going to miss this place. Going to really make my senior year one to remember and something great."

TCU scores first 11 points, goes on to wallop Sam Houston State

Jada Butts scored a game-high 18 points and TCU beat visiting Sam Houston 85-59 in the women's basketball season opener Friday night at the University Recreation Center.

TCU opened the game by scoring 11 straight points. Butts, Zahna Medley and AJ Alix hit 3-pointers in the first three minutes of the game to help the Frogs build a double-digit lead.

The Frogs used three runs of at least 9-0 or better in the opening half. TCU limited the Bearcats to just 16.7 percent shooting from the field in the first half.

"This was a great chance for us to get in the win column," coach Raegan Pebley. "I was proud of the effort our team played with and the sustained effort [we had]. We made mistakes, but I felt like our effort made up for those mistakes throughout the game."

Butts had one of her best outings of her career to open the season, posting 18 points on 6-of-8 shooting and getting five steals in just 21 minutes.

It was also a historic night for Medley as she entered the top five in the TCU record book for career points, the top four in career assists and moved into second in career three-point field goals. Medley finished with 12 points.

Alix added 11 points and Veja Hamilton had 12 points to round out the four Frogs in double figures.

TCU women aim to keep scoring in bunches against New Orleans

If head coach Raegan Pebley's offense is running smoothly, multiple TCU scorers should find themselves finishing with double-digit point totals.

For the second straight game, TCU (1-0) had four pass the 10-point mark, including TCU's 85-59 win over Sam Houston State on Friday night and the team's exhibition against Texas Wesleyan on Nov. 8.

Zahna Medley and Veja Hamilton along with AJ Alix posted double-digit totals in both games. On Friday, Jada Butts led the charge, scoring a game-high 18 points to add to eight rebounds and five assists.

"That should be a staple of our system offensively is that we've got four players averaging in double figures that are a hard matchup because so many people can score," Pebley said. "We say everyone's got a green light. If it's a good shot, you're supposed to look to take that shot. No one's got a red light."

TCU held Sam Houston State to 29.4 percent shooting in the season opener, leading into another offensive test against New Orleans, which returns six of its seven top scorers from last season. Leading the Privateers is Randi Brown, who averaged 12.7 points per game last season.

Sunday's game, the second in three days for TCU, will open the season for the Privateers, who were selected to finish 11th out of 13 teams in the Southland Conference this season by the league's coaches.

TCU dominates inside in overpowering victory over New Orleans

For a team that has made the 3-pointer an integral part of its identity for several years, it was work in the paint that defined the TCU women's basketball team's first two wins of the year.

Sunday, thanks to 40 points in the lane, TCU beat New Orleans 85-36, tying for the 11th fewest points scored by a TCU opponent.

Of the Horned Frogs' 29 field goals, 20 were layups. Guard Toree Thompson connected with four 3-pointers, along with Zahna Medley's three 3-pointers and Caitlin Diaz's one from long range.

"We know we have a good transition offense, but our game plan was to push primary because we knew they weren't as good defensively in the transition area, so that was kind of our game plan and we just stuck to it during the game and executed," Medley said.

However, only 16 of TCU's 85 points were transition buckets. So far, the Frogs have added a new dynamic to the team this season, the ability to get to the basket off dribble penetration.

"I think one of the things last year we had — Zahna did a great job with it — she was one of the only players that consistently were able to, what we call, win paint," coach Raegan Pebley said. "Get the ball into the paint. This year, we've got a lot of players that can do that."

Medley, continued to make points off dribble penetration a key to her game, leading her to a game-high 21 points.

For the third straight game, including TCU's exhibition game against Texas Wesleyan, four TCU players finished in double-digit scoring, a mark Pebley said is the standard for her system.

After a double-digit point total in TCU's exhibition match, Destyne Hives-McCray joined that group again with 10 points to go along with a team-high six rebounds.

Her experience in the paint has been key in the emergence of a post presence in TCU's program, epitomized by a pump-fake, spinning post move that resulted in a layup in the third quarter.

"I think we have a post presence this year and we're using that to our advantage and really getting it inside to the post," Medley said.

Freshman post Jordan Moore had the first double-digit scoring performance of her career with 11 as well as Thompson with 13.

"It was fantastic because she's a freshman, so she's getting used to that post play and playing at the collegiate level," Medley said of Moore. "Just being strong and building that confidence in the pre-conference will be really big for her."

New Orleans' physical play added a new test to the nonconference résumé of the Frogs. Despite posting the seventh-lowest field goal percentage of a TCU opponent at 20 percent and the seventh fewest points allowed by TCU after the first half with 12, the Privateers gave TCU a look they needed to see.

"They outworked people at the end of the season last year," Pebley said. "We talked a lot about how we have to match, if not exceed, their energy and their high level and show some toughness in return."

With the aggressive full-court press that is a staple of TCU under Pebley, TCU forced 28 turnovers, which resulted in 26 points for the Frogs.

For Pebley, it wasn't necessarily the high total on the stat sheet that marked success on the defensive end of the court, but building trust in a young bench.

"One of the things that we're really working on and trying to do is playing consistent basketball and not playing to a scoreboard," she said. "I didn't feel like we did that in the second half against Sam Houston."

"I felt like there was more attention to emptying out while we were in the game whether you were in for a six-minute stretch or a two-minute stretch. Continuing to build that depth and the trust in our depth that when they come in they will also

sustain a high level of competitiveness.”

TCU women's newcomer returns to former home to face SMU

TCU Horned Frogs leap past SMU; start season 3-0

The Horned Frogs hit the court with high energy that at one point deemed too much for SMU to keep up with. TCU definitely took charge of the momentum for most of the first half.

The cross-town rivals had a passionate back and forth first quarter with TCU's senior guard Zahna Medley and SMU's sophomore forward Alicia Froling going shot for shot.

Trying to slow down the Horned Frogs offense, the Mustangs double-teamed Medley all night long. However, that was not enough as the All-American finished the first half with 15 points, 3 rebounds, and 4 assists.

Froling was playing a physical game as well with 11 points, 6 rebounds, and 1 assist at the end of the second quarter. The Horned Frogs started scoring quickly and early in the first half, resulting in a 55-35 lead going into halftime, which is a key factor to winning according to TCU head coach Raegan Pebley.

One thing is for sure, TCU is stacked with shooters from the court to the bench and SMU head coach Rhonda Rompola seems to agree.

“Veja Hamilton, that first half, was just on point...she's a great mid-range jump shooter,” said Coach Rompola.

In fact, before tonight's game the Horned Frogs had seven players averaging at least 8 points a game, including newcomers freshman Jordan Moore, senior transfer Destynee Hives-McCray and sophomore transfer Toree Thompson.

The second half was a game of catch-up for the Mustangs as the Horned Frogs increased their lead to 72-53 at the start of the fourth quarter.

“I talked about our fight and emotion, not having our heads down,” said Coach Rompola during halftime.

As TCU cranked up the intensity with fluid ball movement in the field, SMU answered right back cutting the lead down to 88-75 with less than two minutes left in regulation.

“We were able to build a lead, and I knew they were going to come back because they are a good team,” said coach Pebley.

Time was not on the Mustangs side as the Horned Frogs snubbed the win with a final score of 89-79.

“We just didn't get enough stops...every time we would creep up we would get it to maybe ten. We had a couple of transition situations where we made the wrong decisions...”

“Our game plan was to stay on the shooters and every time we had a defensive error, they took advantage of it,” said Coach Rompola.

The Mustangs errors indeed paved a way for the Horned Frogs to capitalize and score each time. SMU women's hoops have one thing on their mind: bounce back from last season's injury depleted team. SMU suffered 14 straight losses finishing with the worst record (7-23) in head coach Rompola's 24 seasons.

Mustangs junior guard Ashley Gibson and Froling were the main scorers for SMU down in the paint. Gibson finished the night with 18 points and 4 assists along with Froling banking in 26 points and 14 rebounds.

The Horned Frogs were perfect on the evening in free throws making all nine attempts.

Medley ended the night with 17 points, 3 rebounds and 7 assists and senior guard Veja Hamilton adding 15 points, 6 rebounds and 4 assists. The duo also had help from Moore and Hives-McCray with 12 points and Thompson with 13 points.

“Anytime you can get a win on the road; that's awesome.”

“It's confidence when you can win on the road...A&M is going to be a whole new game, and we are going to have to play great team basketball to beat them in College Station,” said coach Pebley.

TCU hits the road again on Saturday to take on No. 12 Texas A&M. Tip-off is set for 12:30 pm.

TCU women's basketball eager for matchup with Texas A&M

The TCU women's basketball team knows the value of a game and a win.

Last season, the Horned Frogs missed a berth into the NCAA tournament by the narrowest of margins, holding a résumé that the committee deemed just a little less strong than a few other programs.

The Horned Frogs (3-0) have a chance to make a big statement toward their case for an NCAA tournament slot when they travel to College Station on Saturday to face No. 12 Texas A&M.

“Our team talked a lot about what happened last year and what we needed to learn from it and taking advantage of every game and every opportunity and being ready to play and not finding ourselves in February where we feel the pressure in February that we have to win every single game once we hit conference,” TCU coach Raegan Pebley said.

Texas A&M (3-0) is coming off a 72-66 overtime win over No. 14 Duke on Wednesday at Cameron Indoor Stadium.

TCU's young post corps will be tested with the A&M tandem of 6-foot-5 Khaalia Hillsman and 6-foot-1 Courtney Williams filling the paint. Williams averages 13.3 points per game and 2.3 rebounds per game behind only guard Courtney Walker, who leads the team at 16.3 points per game.

“A&M is A&M,” Pebley said. “They are a program that has a national championship under their belt. They just beat Duke on Duke's home floor. I know their post players had an impact on that win.”

TCU women's upset bid at No. 12 Texas A&M denied

Naturally, TCU coach Raegan Pebley said she wasn't going to take any moral victories from the Horned Frogs' 82-78 loss to No. 12 Texas A&M on Saturday.

Her team led for just over 32 minutes of the 40-minute contest. While All-America candidate and leading scorer Zahna Medley was held to just six points, sophomores AJ Alix and Toree Thompson stepped up with 24- and 16-point performances, respectively.

The tandem combined to shoot 10-for-11 from 3-point range and were perfect until an Alix miss with 44 seconds left in the game.

No. No moral victories.

“Obviously, we wanted to see this turn out another way and get a win, but when it came down to it at the very end, we didn't execute well enough and close games like this go to the teams that rebound better and execute better,” Pebley said.

That doesn't mean, however, that a four-point loss to the No. 12 team in the nation on the road won't be a quality loss in the long run for a team that had the door to last season's NCAA Tournament slammed shut with their toes on the threshold.

“I think this is a game that, ideally, even though we lost, helps A&M when they are looking at seeding in the NCAA Tournament at the end of the year,” Pebley said. “Even though we lost, it's helping us as well. A&M is a good team and is going to do well as the season goes on.”

After TCU (3-1) took a 17-16 lead with 2 1/2 minutes remaining in the first quarter on one of four 3-pointers from Thompson, the Frogs would maintain control of the game until the final three minutes.

It would come down to the final three possessions.

After TCU junior Jada Butts missed a layup with A&M holding a 78-76 lead, the Aggies then were able to isolate senior guard Jordan Jones, from DeSoto, on offense, leading to a layup with just over a minute left.

Alix pulled the Frogs back within two on a layup off a pass while cutting through the paint, leaving 35 seconds on the clock.

TCU elected not to foul and try to force a turnover with aggressive defense. But A&M senior Courtney Walker hit a jumper that would seal the victory for the Aggies (4-0).

“We made a defensive mistake and allowed too much time to be able to come off,” Pebley said. “We actually probably made two or three mistakes in that series right there, including not calling a timeout after the score.”

Walker finished with a team-high 23 points, bested in the game only by Alix, who surpassed her previous career high of 11 points.

“That Alix kid was going against the defensive player of the year and she knocked down 24 on her,” A&M coach Gary Blair said.

“You've just got to tip your hat to the kid.”

When conference play draws to a close, committee eyes will be drawn back to Saturday should TCU again be in the running for an NCAA berth.

It was a game that showed the country what Pebley said she already knew.

“I think, considering we only shot 10 free

throws to their 20, I think it says quite a lot," she said. "We definitely, I think, had an aggressive offensive mentality as well. I didn't need this game for me to see that our team is improved from last year. We didn't need this game to really be able to tell that we believe in ourselves."

And Blair, who has won a national championship for a program that is perennially a tournament contender, agreed.

"TCU is sort of the new kid on the block," he said. "Sort of like we were at A&M. Now I think TCU is going to fit into that top four over in that league over there and start battling Iowa State and Oklahoma State and some of the ones that are used to being up there."

Medley nets 1,500th point as TCU women beat Prairie View A&M

TCU senior guard Zahna Medley spotted up behind the 3-point line with just over eight minutes to go in the third quarter and drilled her 240th career shot from beyond the arc.

While one of many shots from range — a skill that has been a staple of Medley's game since Day 1 — that 3-pointer tallied her 1,500th career point in TCU's 69-60 win over Prairie View A&M on Tuesday night, making her the fifth player in TCU women's basketball history to achieve that milestone.

"It means a lot to me," Medley said. "Not many people are blessed to have the success that I've been able to have, but it's not been just because of me. It's been because of my teammates getting me the ball when I'm open."

Medley is the 45th player in Big 12 women's basketball history to reach 1,500 points — a list that includes current TCU assistant coach Edwina Brown from her playing days at Texas.

"It means a lot to share that record," Medley said. "I have high respect for her. I really look up to her; she's a great mentor, she's my position coach. She was an amazing player during her career, so knowing I have her as my coach and that I have kind of been put in the same category as her means a lot. She has helped me to get where I am today."

The Lady Panthers began the game with an active transition game, jumping to an early 16-9 lead in the first. Prairie View controlled the boards, outrebounding the Horned Frogs 10-8 just minutes into the game.

As the rebounding deficit decreased, so did the score, with TCU regaining the lead with just over three minutes left in the first half.

"I think we tried to settle in and play a little better half-court defense, and that allowed us to be in better rebounding position," coach Raegan Pebley said.

TCU went on a 24-10 rebounding run that led to a 38-35 halftime lead.

Prairie View pulled within four in the final frame, but a 4-for-6 free-throw performance in the final minute by freshman center Jordan Moore and senior Veja Hamilton was enough to seal the victory.

Hamilton and Medley had 15 points to lead the Frogs, followed by Jada Butts with 12.

"It's awesome," Pebley said of Medley's achievement. "I'm happy for her. I know that's not what her sole focus is. It'll be something fun that she will be able to tell her kids."

TCU women use Medley's 31 to escape UT Rio Grande Valley

Hours before Saturday's matinee against UT Rio Grande Valley, the TCU women's basketball team discovered that two starters and a key role player were unable to play due to injury.

Leaning heavily on veteran leadership and the scoring touch of senior guard Zahna Medley, the Horned Frogs overcame a five-point deficit late in the fourth quarter to beat the Vaqueros 71-67.

Medley finished with a season-high 31 points, marking the third game in her career with 30-plus points and the 25th time in program history that a player scored 30 or more.

It was the highest point total of any player under coach Raegan Pebley at TCU.

"I knew I needed to take a stronger leadership role because we had one of our captains out," Medley said. "And I knew I needed to be a little more aggressive because some points were taken away from [the injured Frogs] not playing"

Second-leading scorer Veja Hamilton and sophomore starter AJ Alix did not play Saturday due to undisclosed "short term" injuries, Pebley said.

Pebley added that freshman Ola Akomolafe will miss at least two weeks with an undisclosed injury. The forward averages 2.5 points and 1.8 rebounds per game.

Rio Grande Valley (4-3) held a five-point lead with just under three minutes to play when Jada Butts and Medley combined for 10 points in a 12-3 run to close out the win for TCU.

Momentum shifted in TCU's favor when Medley came off two screens and hit a one-footed fadeaway 3-pointer from the right wing to cut the Vaqueros' lead to one.

"I was just sticking to the game plan that the coaches provided for us," Medley said. "They let us know that they were going under on ball screens, so I knew on that play that they were going to go under, so I just read the screening right, and the defense right, and knocked down the shot."

Medley followed with a layup and a foul, making the ensuing free throw and giving TCU (5-1) a lead it wouldn't relinquish in the final 51 seconds of the game.

Medley also finished with a career-high seven rebounds Saturday. Butts added 10 points, and freshman center Jordan Moore had 10 points and nine rebounds.

Caitlin Diaz played a career-high 33 minutes, recording nine rebounds and seven points.

TCU won down the stretch by hitting 6 of 7 from the free-throw line in the final two minutes. TCU entered the game shooting just 64.6 percent from the foul line.

"It was great; that might have been the difference in the game," Pebley said. "Being able to hit the free throws allowed us to get our press set up a couple of times. It was huge that we got these."

The Frogs turned the ball over 16 times, leading to 26 points for the Vaqueros, but Pebley was happy with the fight her veterans showed to overcome the miscues.

"I was proud of not just their performance, but also their patience and the way they led and communicated with some of the younger players," Pebley said. "There were a lot of mistakes that some of our younger players made under stressful situations. I feel like their leadership was needed today."

Obert's triple double pushes Butler past TCU

With a national TV audience watching and a

talented Big 12 opponent in front of them, the Butler women's basketball team had the opportunity to make a statement on Tuesday night.

The Bulldogs certainly took advantage, making the final run in a tug-of-war game to beat the TCU Horned Frogs 65-53 at Hinkle Fieldhouse.

Butler (4-2) played well defensively in the first quarter, holding TCU (5-2) to just 23 percent shooting from the floor. However, the Bulldogs allowed seven offensive rebounds leading to eight second-chance points, and the game was tied at 12 after the opening period.

The Horned Frogs came out of the huddle firing on all cylinders to start the second quarter, going on a 14-4 run that gave them a ten-point advantage. Then, suddenly, the momentum completely shifted.

The Bulldogs held TCU scoreless for almost six minutes, going on an 11-0 run that gave them a one-point lead. The Frogs finally ended the drought with a three-pointer, followed by Blaire Langlois hitting a jumper with five seconds remaining for the home team. That ended the roller coaster quarter, and the teams were tied at 29 headed into the locker room.

Butler Head Coach Kurt Godlevske said that while his team had a few difficult stretches in the first half, they have made strides in each game this season.

"I think you focus on the little things," he said. "For us that's so important. When we do the little things right we're really good. So when they make big runs on us, it's because we're having breakdowns, mental mistakes. We're just trying to correct those. And the kids, to their credit, they're becoming fewer and fewer every game and that's kind of our growth process."

Butler sophomore Sydney Buck had 10 points, including two three-pointers in her team's 65-53 win over TCU on Tuesday.

Neither side could create much separation in the third quarter, as each team had a scoring drought that lasted more than three minutes. Butler was able to take a slim 45-43 advantage into the final quarter of play.

It was another run to start the fourth quarter, this time 11-0 by the Bulldogs. And this time, Butler wouldn't allow the Horned Frogs to respond.

Godlevske said that while he was happy to get the win, the way his team played was the biggest takeaway of the night.

"(I am) more excited about just how we played and how we dug our heels in," he said. "How we defended, how we rebounded, and how we really executed. We made a nice adjustment in the second half, and for the kids to be able to come and do that, I thought was huge for us."

Fifth-year senior Belle Obert recorded a triple-double with 12 points, 11 rebounds and 10 blocks. She became the 20th player in Big East history to accomplish the feat, and just the second to do so with points, rebounds and blocks.

Obert said that she didn't know that she was near a triple-double until after the game, when one of the assistant coaches told her that she came up one block short before realizing that the milestone had been reached.

The Butler center deflected attention from her stat line, saying the victory was a building block for the youthful group.

"We're such a young team, and really a program that's growing each and every year," she said. "Getting wins like that, is just huge for our confidence and going forward knowing that, 'hey, we can hang with the big dogs no matter what.'"

Freshman Tori Schickel led Butler with 21 points and 12 rebounds. Zahna Medley was the leading scorer for TCU with 13 points.

Butler's next game comes on Friday, when they travel to Dayton to take on Wright State.

Key players returning to TCU women's basketball lineup

The Horned Frogs (5-2) will still be without forwards Adeola Akomolafe and Destynnee Hives-McCray for the game against Louisiana-Monroe at 2 p.m. Saturday at the University Recreation Center.

Hives-McCray averages 7.2 points and 5.7 rebounds per game.

ULM (4-2) presents a challenge in the post with 6-foot-1 senior Alayshia Hunter, who leads the team in scoring at 18 points per game, and from the perimeter with sophomore guard Chelsea Tieuel, averaging 12.7 points per game thanks to a 48.5 percent clip on 3-pointers.

The Warhawks already have a win over in-state rival LSU, 61-54 in overtime on Nov. 15.

"They are a team that, I think, has some confidence coming into this game, not just because of their record, but because of a really quality win like that," Pebley said.

Zahna Medley's 20 points sparks TCU women to rout of Louisiana Monroe

Alayshia Hunter was the only player to finish in double figures for the Warhawks.

"We have such a great atmosphere in our gym that we are excited to carry over into the new [Schollmaier] arena," TCU coach Raegan Pebley said

of winning 11 straight at home. "It's a great home-court advantage that we look forward to carrying over."

TCU women shoot record percentage in win over SFA

The first half was all the TCU women needed to build a lead that Stephen F. Austin couldn't surmount in an 88-55 win Wednesday night at the University Recreation Center.

TCU shot 71.4 percent from the field in the first half, hitting 20 of 28 shots, making the fourth time the Horned Frogs have surpassed the 60 percent mark in a half under coach Raegan Pebley, but first time in the opening half.

The Frogs (7-2) finished the game shooting 61.5 percent from the field, a school record.

After shooting just 5 for 14 in the third, TCU rallied in the fourth to outscore SFA 22-16.

"I was not happy at the end of that [third] quarter," Pebley said. "Felt like we played a bit better in the fourth quarter, but we had so much to gain back from just a mindset that we lost in that third quarter."

TCU finished with five players in double figures, led by sophomore Toree Thompson with 14. Zahna Medley, TCU's leading scorer averaging 16.9 points per game entering Wednesday, had 11 on a night when several players had the hot hand.

"She's not in the locker room right now stressing out that she only scored 11," Pebley said. "She's thinking about how her defense was and how her team performed. She's been such a great leader for us."

Senior Caitlin Diaz finished with a career-high 11 points to go with three rebounds in a game that utilized her defensive energy off the bench.

"Yeah, defense fuels our offense," Diaz said. "If we play defense and just run through our offense, we try to find shots in there. Just run through it and don't force anything and that's what fueled us today."

TCU enters its second straight game with a healthy rotation after sixth man Destynnee Hives-McCray returned to action Wednesday after missing two games with an undisclosed injury. Sophomore guard A.J. Alix returned for the Louisiana-Monroe game on Dec. 5 after missing two games with an undisclosed injury.

"We could still win games without us, but it's always good to have everyone on the team back," Alix said.

TCU women can't keep pace with No. 3 Notre Dame

The TCU women saw a 12-game home winning streak snapped at the hands of No. 3 Notre Dame on Saturday 88-72 in the team's final game in the University Recreation Center.

TCU (7-3) pulled within three points early in the second quarter, but had no answer for Notre Dame's 3-point shooting ability from the corners.

The Irish (9-1) moved the ball around the perimeter until getting a wide-open 3-point look, and senior guard Michaela Mabrey hit three consecutive 3-pointers midway through the second quarter, including two from the corners as Notre Dame pushed it lead to 11.

"I felt like, with our team, our transition defense wasn't good enough," TCU coach Raegan Pebley said. "This was probably a game where we go back and look at film more. We're going to see that the team that gave up the most uncontested shots was the team that lost."

The Irish began to pull away early in the second half, shooting 6 for 8 from the field in the first five minutes. With freshman center Jordan Moore on the bench in favor of a more athletic lineup, Irish coach Muffet McGraw worked guard mismatches in the post for high-percentage shots.

"We went smaller in the second half because they didn't have the big [players] in there, and I think that was to our advantage," McGraw said.

TCU's offense flowed through Moore to begin the game, netting two of three shots from the field in the opening minutes.

Moore, a freshman from Round Rock, played 19 minutes, slightly down from a 22.8 average over the past four games, with 13 minutes coming in the first half.

"I really am trying to keep up with my team,"

Moore said. "My guards give me the ball and I try to finish strong as best as I can."

Moore finished with eight points and six rebounds.

Senior guard Zahna Medley scored a game-high 22 points, bested only this season by her 31-point performance against UT Rio Grande Valley on Nov. 28.

"She mixed it up well, driving and shooting the three," McGraw said of Medley. "Went to the basket well. Just really hard to guard. Obviously, a tough matchup for us."

Five Irish players finished in double figures, led by freshman guard Arike Ogunbowale with a career-high 21. Kathryn Westbeld collected her second career double-double with 12 points and 14 rebounds.

With the loss, TCU closes its stay at the University Recreation Center with a 21-4 record with two of the four losses coming against top-five ranked teams. The Frogs move into the newly renovated Ed and Rae Schollmaier Arena for the first time Dec. 20 against Southern Utah.

Expanded concourse, TCU Hall of Fame highlight renovated Schollmaier Arena

The view from the seats of the newly renovated Ed and Rae Schollmaier Arena has the familiar layout of the arena formerly known as Daniel-Meyer Coliseum.

It's the concourse where most of the \$72 million was spent.

From the purple and white floors to pictures of teams and the campus scaling the walls, a new Horned Frog experience awaits fans entering Schollmaier Arena.

The arena opens Saturday for fall commencement, followed by men's and women's games at 1 and 3:30 p.m. Sunday.

"We think that this will help reunite a lot of our basketball fans that may have gotten a little soft in coming to ball games because the arena didn't offer some of the amenities," associate athletic director Ross Bailey said Tuesday during a media tour of the arena.

A record-number 3,678 season tickets have been sold for men's basketball, TCU officials said. The Horned Frogs averaged 4,955 in 2013-14 before moving their home games to Wilkerson-Greines Activity Center during the renovations.

Fans entering the arena's main doors will find the Horned Frog Hall of Fame just to their left. Many of TCU's most prestigious trophies are on display, including the 2011 Rose Bowl trophy and Davey O'Brien's 1938 Heisman Trophy.

The displays were made possible by donations from several former TCU athletes, including Matt Carpenter of the St. Louis Cardinals.

Improved concession stands, more restrooms and a seating area overlooking Amon G. Carter Stadium have been added.

Below the concourse, new circular locker rooms feature dark-stained wooden lockers, team lounges and a theater-style meeting room.

On game days, boosters can watch the game from a club on floor-to-ceiling TVs. After the game, they can watch the press conferences through a glass wall that separates the club and media workroom.

The Horned Frogs will take the court on a

floor with a subtle lizard-skin pattern designed by Nike. Bringing over a tradition from the football team, a red 3-point line arcs over a black-and-purple lane. The color has been used as an accent on football uniforms for several years.

A video board a third larger than the old one hangs over the court and smaller ones hang above the portals from the concourse to the arena.

TCU women begin new era by hosting Southern Utah at Schollmaier Arena

TCU women find renovated arena to their liking with easy victory

The TCU women's 52.6 shooting percentage from both the field and from behind the arc in the Horned Frogs' 76-47 win over Southern Utah on Sunday was a welcome surprise to coach Raegan Pebley.

A morning shoot-around just hours before the game was the first time the team had a chance to shoot on the baskets of the newly renovated Schollmaier Arena, stationed in their regulation positions on the court.

Twice they had practiced in the arena, which underwent \$72 million in renovations over the past season and a half, with the baskets several inches off their affixed positions.

"As a coach, without telling them, I was a little concerned with what our field goal percentage would be," Pebley said.

TCU shot 10 for 19 from 3-point range, including a 3-for-3 performance from AJ Alix and 4-of-5 night for Toree Thompson.

It was the second time in three games for TCU to shoot more than 50 percent from the field, including a record 61.5 percent against Stephen F. Austin on Dec. 9.

TCU (8-3) opened the game without hesitation, mounting a 10-0 run early in the first quarter.

The Horned Frogs' 29 points in the first quarter were the most the team has posted in an opening frame this season, the first divided into four quarters of play.

Senior guard Veja Hamilton, who has dropped slightly this season after finishing sixth in the Big 12 in shooting percentage last season, found a spark in the new arena. She finished with a team-high and season-high 18 points, shooting 9 for 14 from the field.

"Honestly, my teammates did a really good job of finding me when I was open," Hamilton said. "Their timing and our chemistry is what gave me confidence to shoot when I was open."

Thunderbirds junior guard Jessica Richardson led both teams in scoring with 23 points, a season high.

After a week off due to finals, Pebley changed her starting lineup, giving senior forward Caitlin Diaz the nod over junior Jada Butts.

Diaz finished with a season-high 10 rebounds, one shy of her career high of 11.

"Caitlin had been playing with a senior sense of urgency," Pebley said. "She had been doing a great job coming off the bench and executing and just in practice, there was a consistent focus out of her in practice. She wasn't complacent."

Nostalgia set in for Pebley after the game, remembering that her first game as a head coach was against the very Southern Utah program (2-8) that TCU beat Sunday, marking the first women's basketball victory in Schollmaier Arena.

The team takes a short break for the Christmas holiday before returning to action Dec. 30 at Texas Tech.

The Frogs then return to Schollmaier Arena for the first home conference game of the season against former TCU coach Jeff Mittie and Kansas State.

"I think one of the coolest things about today and being able to play this first game here in Ed and Rae Schollmaier Arena is that we get to do it again," Pebley said. "It was so fun. It really sunk in as the game was going on in my head, thinking this was our home."

TCU women begin conference play at Texas Tech

With the strength of the Big 12, the TCU women's basketball team has the opportunities it needs to make a push for the NCAA Tournament.

That march through the conference slate begins Wednesday night in Lubbock against a 9-2 Texas Tech squad that is riding an eight-game home winning streak.

TCU finished nonconference play ranked No. 142 in RPI with an 8-3 record, one win shy of the mark coach Raegan Pebley would have liked heading into Big 12 play.

The injury bug bit the Horned Frogs throughout December, putting two TCU starters — AJ Alix and Veja Hamilton — and reserve Destynnee Hives-McCray on the bench for multiple games due to undisclosed ailments.

Both Alix and Hives-McCray missed a key matchup against Big East opponent Butler — a 65-53 loss on Dec. 1.

But Pebley said she has liked the continuity her team has shown despite a rotating lineup.

"I think we've seen that we've got a lot of different ways we can score," she said. "We've got a lot of people that can score. I feel like we've made some strides and some breakthroughs in our communication on defense."

TCU leads the conference in 3-point shooting at 41.3 percent. Toree Thompson not only leads the Horned Frogs but also the conference in 3-point field goal percentage at 54.2. Zahna Medley leads the conference in 3-point field goals made, averaging three per game.

TCU must defend a Texas Tech team with four players averaging double-digit points. Junior guard Ivonne Cook Taylor leads the offensive charge with 14.4 points per game.

TCU women roar back from 15 down to win at Texas Tech

TCU overcame a 15-point second half deficit to beat Texas Tech 78-69 to win a conference opener in the Big 12 for the first time.

TCU (9-3, 1-0) used a 15-0 run near the start of the fourth quarter to erase the Lady Raiders lead. A 3-pointer by Toree Thompson helped TCU build a 69-59 lead.

Thompson and AJ Alix each scored 14 points to lead the Horned Frogs. Jada Butts had 13 points, and Caitlin Diaz led the Frogs with 12 rebounds.

Japreece Dean had 22 points and Leashja Grant 21 for Tech.

TCU won a conference opener for the first time since the 2010-11 season. The Frogs are in their fourth season in the Big 12.

Texas Tech (9-3, 0-1) scored eight of the first 11 points in the second half and to increase a 40-32 halftime lead to 54-39 with 4:24 to go in the third quarter.

Thompson hit a 3-pointer to open the fourth quarter to pull within 57-54 before Texas Tech hit a field goal. Alix hit a 3 to pull TCU within 59-57 with 8:19 to go and begin the 15-0 run.

Thompson tied the game at 59-59 with a layup after a steal by Zahna Medley. Butts then took over, with a tiebreaking free throw followed by a layup, a steal and another layup, and the Frogs were never headed again.

Lady Raiders drop Big 12 opener to TCU 78-69

With a tie game and 7:21 left in the game, TCU went to a full court press, and wherever the ball went, two Horned Frogs were there to trap.

And the Lady Raiders struggled.

Until that mark, Texas Tech had committed seven turnovers, and TCU hadn't scored off any of them.

But three quick turnovers off that press led to three straight layups for the Horned Frogs, a lead and all the momentum as TCU fought back from a 15-point deficit to take a 78-69 victory Wednesday evening at United Supermarkets Arena.

"I thought we played really well at times," Texas Tech coach Candi Whitaker said. "We had a lead and then started missing all our easy shots around the rim and weren't able to convert. We fell apart in transition defense. They were getting layup after layup. TCU continued to run, and unfortunately, we did not. We gave this one away. Had every opportunity to win it. We had a meltdown and that can't happen when you're playing a great team."

The Lady Raiders didn't quit as the game ended, however, as they turned TCU over four times in the final three minutes to go on an 8-0 run and cut the Horned Frog lead to three with 30 seconds left.

Leashja Grant and Japreece Dean combined

for 62.3 percent of the Lady Raiders' points in their loss to open Big 12 play.

Most of the night, when Grant caught the ball, the junior center had at least one foot in the paint, getting good position on her defender.

Grant recorded 21 point Wednesday evening at United Supermarkets Arena.

"I thought LeeLee (Grant) came to play from the get go," Whitaker said. "She was a monster inside as far as boarding it. She's going up against a 6-foot-4 kid that has every advantage. She out-rebounded her. She scored on her."

Dean, the freshman point guard, led the way with 22 points including a 3-pointer as the halftime buzzer sounded.

Overall, Texas Tech shot 37 percent from the floor.

After limiting the Horned Frogs to 32 first half points off 38.2 percent shooting from the floor, TCU exploded for 46 points off 53.6 percent shooting in the second half.

A.J. Alix and Toree Thompson led TCU with 14 points each, followed by Jada Butts with 13 and Jordan Moore with 10.

With an eight-point lead at the half, the Lady Raiders increased their defensive intensity early in the third quarter.

Texas Tech outscored the Horned Frogs 8-3 over the first four minutes of the third quarter with six of those points off three TCU turnovers.

But TCU, trailing by 15 with 4:24 left in the third period, went on a 10-0 run over a two minute span to cut Texas Tech's lead to five.

The Lady Raiders scored only five points, all from the free-throw line, in the final 4:42 of the third quarter.

In the first two quarters, Texas Tech started each one well but struggled down the stretch.

The Lady Raiders started the game shooting 7-of-9 from the floor before hitting only 2-of-8 over the final five minutes of the opening quarter.

With a one-point lead over the Horned Frogs entering the second quarter, Texas Tech went on a quick 7-0 run to gain some separation.

TCU struggled to get any offense going in the second quarter as the Horned Frogs didn't score until the 5:22 mark.

Texas Tech struggled to pull things together, turning the ball over three times during a 3:42 scoring drought.

Just some out of character things and some lackadaisical things and then some out of character melting occurred from our team," Whitaker said.

"We need to have a presence about us. We play a lot of young, inexperienced players for the most part. We have to have a presence about us when things aren't going our way."

Texas Tech women's player hitched ride with TCU for game in Lubbock

Texas Tech women's basketball freshman Zuri Sanders played just one minute in the Lady Raider's 78-69 loss to TCU on Wednesday.

However, thanks to a helping hand from the TCU women's basketball program, it was one more minute than she would have had otherwise.

TCU had planned to take buses to its Big 12 conference opener in Lubbock, but with winter storms ravaging West Texas, the bus company was forced to cancel the trip out of safety concerns.

Weather issues across the country, including storms in Dallas, made commercial travel for an entire team an improbability.

So, TCU resorted to its final option, booking a

chartered plane.

When word got to the Lady Raiders program, they phoned TCU head coach Raegan Pebley to ask for a favor.

Sanders, who hails from Evansville, Ind., had been stranded at DFW International Airport for almost 20 hours after sitting in a plane on the runway for eight hours, trying to return to her team from Christmas break.

She ran out of options to return to Lubbock in time for Wednesday's game.

Without thinking twice about it, TCU gladly offered the helping hand.

"We said absolutely, we don't mind," Pebley said. "I don't know how you would say no in that situation. I guess the way people reacted like we had done something extraordinary makes me think maybe there are people out there that would say no. I couldn't imagine how you would."

Pebley and her staff alerted her players of the situation when Sanders' name came up in the scouting report the day of departure. Coaches and players alike did whatever they could to make the unheard of transportation situation as natural for Sanders, who had been through a difficult end to her holiday break, Pebley said.

"They were really grateful," Pebley said. "They were happy to see her and knew she had been through a lot and glad that her whole travel nightmare was over."

"We were glad to do it and I would really hope and think that anyone else in the Big 12 would have done the same thing if they were in our shoes."

While in Lubbock, TCU overcame a 15-point deficit in the third quarter to notch its first conference win of the season. The Horned Frogs outscored Tech 21-12 in the fourth quarter, shooting 53.5 percent from the field in the second half while shaking off the rust of a nearly two-week vacation from competition.

"That game at Lubbock, being able to pick up a road win early in conference play, I think that is only going to help our confidence moving forward," Pebley said.

The Horned Frogs (9-3, 1-0 in Big 12) return to action Saturday for the first Big 12 game to be played in the newly renovated Schollmaier Arena against former TCU head coach Jeff Mittie and Kansas State (10-2, 0-1 in Big 12).

As is the norm for most Mittie-run programs, Kansas State features a strong base 2-3 defense.

Offensively Kansas State runs through junior center Breanna Lewis, who averages 17.3 points per game.

"She is just so efficient," Pebley said. "She's finishing really, really well. She does a great job establishing her presence right away and sustaining that throughout the entire game."

TCU women moving up in rankings as they face No. 17 Oklahoma

The TCU women's basketball team enters its third Big 12 game with a new source of confidence.

For the first time since the 2011-12 season, the Horned Frogs (10-3, 2-0 in Big 12) received votes in the Associated Press Top 25 poll. They haven't been ranked since they came in at 21st in the Nov. 22, 2010, poll.

With wins over Texas Tech and Kansas State to begin Big 12 play, TCU moved up to No. 93 in RPI after entering conference play ranked No. 142. On Wednesday, they have a chance to boost their ranking when they host No. 17 Oklahoma (10-3, 1-1 in Big

12) at 6 p.m. at Schollmaier Arena.

The Sooners sit third in the conference in 3-point field goals made, averaging 7.69 per game, just behind TCU's 7.85. Oklahoma has two scorers averaging double-figures: Kaylon Williams (14.4) and Peyton Little (12.6).

Three TCU players rank among the league's top five 3-point shooters, led by Toree Thompson's 50.8 percentage, which is the fifth in the nation.

No. 17 Oklahoma women survive TCU scare with fourth-quarter surge

It was smooth sailing for the TCU women through almost three quarters against No. 17 Oklahoma on Wednesday.

But just like that, it was all gone.

Oklahoma rallied from a 14-point deficit in the third period to upend the Horned Frogs 78-65, handing TCU its first loss in Big 12 play.

TCU (10-4, 2-1 Big 12) led for the first 34 minutes of the game, but in the course of an 18-1 Sooners run in the fourth quarter, Oklahoma took its first lead, which it held for the final 3:06.

Oklahoma (11-3, 2-1) outrebounded TCU 16-6 in the fourth quarter, including six on offense. TCU failed to pull down an offensive rebound in the fourth quarter.

Oklahoma scored 27 points off second-chance opportunities. TCU also committed 22 turnovers, resulting in 25 OU points.

"They made us pay for them that quick," TCU coach Raegen Pebley said. "That fast. They're a good team and there's not a single team in the Big 12 that you could feel comfortable with the lead. Not until that final buzzer."

The Horned Frogs were held scoreless from the field for the final seven minutes of the game, missing their final seven attempts.

At halftime, TCU led 38-32, aided by a 6-for-11 performance from behind the 3-point arc. Both Zahna Medley and AJ Alix shot 2-for-4 from 3-point range in the first half. Medley finished with a game-high 19 points. However, TCU hit only 2-of-5 in the second half.

Senior Kaylon Williams led Oklahoma with 18 points and 10 rebounds for her sixth double-double of the season and 15th of her career.

Alix scored 14 points and was 3-of-5 from 3-point range but turned the ball over six times. She finished with four assists.

"I'm confident that we're going to continue to see AJ growing," Pebley said. "This will not be part of her identity."

TCU center Jordan Moore played most of her 19 minutes in the first half and finished with a career-high five blocks, and Junior Jada Butts finished a rebound shy of her first career double-double with 11 points and nine rebounds.

"TCU is a really good team," Oklahoma coach Sherri Coale said. "There are going to be so many teams in our league that come in here and do not survive."

Edwards fuels huge Sooner rally past Frogs

The second half of the fourth quarter still to play, the Oklahoma women trailed TCU by six points and guess who Sooner coach Sherri Coale had on the floor?

McKenna Treece.

T'Ona Edwards.

Derica Wyatt.

Peyton Little.

Kaylon Williams.

Not Gabbi Ortiz.

Not Maddie Manning.

And with that cast, not only did the Sooners complete a comeback that began when they trailed by 14 points in the third quarter, but they won going away, 78-65.

Once again, OU couldn't shoot the ball, finishing at 41.7 percent (26 of 68) from the floor and 23.8 percent (5 of 21) from 3-point land.

Also, Wednesday, two of the squad's thought-to-be best players — Ortiz and Manning — were not good at all, combining to make just 3 of 13 shots and play just 12 combined second-half minutes.

Yet, instead of cratering, with at least a partially thrown together lineup, OU found a way not only to beat a good team on the road, but a team Coale had said only two days earlier was arguably "playing better than anybody in the league right now."

"I would like to be able to explain to you what happened, but I'm not really sure," Coale said. "We were less than stellar for three quarters but then in the fourth quarter, we played hard, we played together, we played connected and I think you saw a will, a refuse to lose mentality."

The Sooner comeback actually came in stages, with the first one beginning after TCU began the second half on a 13-2 run to lead 48-34.

From there, OU treaded water until closing the quarter on a 10-0 sprint that included points from four different sources: Little (4), Williams (2), Wyatt (2) and Vionise Pierre-Louis. It brought OU within 54-50.

The Sooners trailed 60-52 in the fourth quarter with 6:06 remaining when Treece, a reserve post, rebounded a missed 3 try from Ortiz and hit a jumper from the baseline.

Soon, Ortiz replaced Edwards on the floor and OU pulled its best basketball in several games.

"It was just a demeanor and this one to the left [Edwards] just had a fight in her that bled into the rest of us," post Kaylon Williams said. "We just wanted it to do it for each other ... just making sure we fight and pull it out together."

The Sooners' 2-0 run, began by Treece, became a 24-5 run by game's end.

Treece led the Sooners with seven fourth-quarter points. Little added six and Edwards and Manning — inserted to shoot free throws over the final 2 minutes — both added five.

The victory brought the 18th-ranked Sooners to 11-3 overall and 2-1 in the Big 12, while TCU fell to 10-4 and 2-1.

Williams continued her strong play inside finishing with 18 points and a game-high 10 rebounds, while Little added 15 and, getting in passing lanes, snared five steals.

But it was Edwards' line that stood out: a career-high 28 minutes, a career-high nine assists, a career-high four steals and 10 points, one less than her career-high entering the night.

"I know that (my teammates) trust me to do what I do," Edwards said. "To just continue to talk to them and continue to tell them that we weren't going to lose the game."

Zahna Medley led TCU with 19 points. A.J. Elix added 14 and Jada Butts came off the bench to finish with 11 points and nine rebounds.

Conference success is about stealing games away from home and the Sooners can build on it playing two of their next three games at home, against Kansas State and Texas Tech, with a Stillwater Bedlam trip sandwiched in between.

Because they found a way at the Frogs' new Schollmaier Arena, there is a new reason for optimism.

"TCU is a really good team," Coale said.

"There are going to be so many teams in our league that come in here and don't survive."

For TCU women, 61-58 holds positive significance against No. 6 Baylor

61-58.

The score that has become a rallying cry for Baylor fans since Bears beat TCU on the football field in a top-10 ranked matchup at McLane Stadium on Oct. 12, 2014.

However, in women's basketball, the opposite rings true for the Horned Frogs.

TCU women's basketball team beat Baylor in Waco for the first time on Feb. 4, 1987.

The score on the scoreboard when the clock hit 0:00 — 61-58.

Twenty-eight years later, both teams statistically resemble their football counterparts.

Saturday, the Big 12's top two scoring offenses face off in Waco, with Baylor (15-1, 2-1 in Big 12) leading the way averaging 80.4 points per game. TCU (10-4, 2-1 in Big 12) comes in just behind at a 76.9 average per game.

However, sitting as the No. 6 team in the nation in the AP Top 25, Baylor holds the top spot in 14 of the Big 12's statistical categories, including scoring margin (+29.1), field goal percentage (50.3), 3-point field goal percentage defense (25.4), assists per game (23.8), steals per game (10.1), assist to turnover ration (1.5) and offensive rebounds per game (15.7).

Opposite Baylor's league-leading defense against the 3-pointer is TCU's 42.13-point field goal percentage, which also tops the Big 12.

Baylor enters the first meeting of the two program's this season riding an 18-game winning streak against TCU.

Since the 1987 win, the Frogs only have one other win in Waco — Jan. 27, 1990.

The last time the Horned Frogs knocked off the Lady Bears was Feb. 28, 1990, in Fort Worth.

Big 12's top offenses collide as Lady Bears host TCU

The Baylor women are still a work in progress, as the team continues to tweak issues on both ends of the court in the early stages of Big 12 play. Regardless, the wins keep rolling in for the sixth-ranked Lady Bears as they await archrival TCU on Saturday.

Baylor (15-1, 2-1 Big 12) has rattled off back-to-back wins over conference opponents since their lone loss of the season against Oklahoma State last Wednesday. Now, they have the opportunity to start building distance in the Big 12 standings from the five other teams also sitting at 2-1. It won't necessarily be easy.

"We've got a long way to go, but the good news is that we're winning games," Lady Bears head coach Kim Mulkey said. "We may be winning them ugly, but we have played a good schedule, so there are going to be ugly games. And there are going to be more ugly games because now you're in conference play."

Baylor continues to get looks at different kinds of play styles in the early conference slate,

from the physical, paint-focused Oklahoma State to perimeter-powered Oklahoma. TCU (10-4, 2-1) brings another perspective: an aggressive, fast-paced system that can score points in bunches, but also sacrifice plenty as well.

The Lady Bears and Horned Frogs are ranked first and second, respectively, in the Big 12 in points per game, but TCU is also second-to-last in scoring defense and field goal defense.

"They play a style that's very difficult to defend," Mulkey said. "It's almost like they never stop moving for the entire game. They're going to push it and think they can outscore you. We're going to have to score with them, but not get caught up in a track meet and turn the ball over and take bad shots. They shoot the 3-ball extremely well at all positions. While they are not as big as we are, they certainly have guard play that has a lot of depth."

TCU leads the conference in 3-point percentage at 42.1 percent, with three Horned Frogs among the conference's top four long-range shooters.

That includes two-time All-Big 12 selection Zahna Medley, who ranks sixth in the Big 12 conference with 16.5 points per game. She's coming off a 19-point performance against Oklahoma on Wednesday, which included three treys.

"She sees the floor well and she can penetrate and score," Mulkey said. "She can shoot the 3 ball. They're playing her a little bit at both the one and the two this year, whereas in the past she's been mainly at the point."

TCU is also getting accurate 3-point shooting off the bench from guard Toree Thompson, the Big 12's leader from the arc at 50 percent on 62 tries. A.J. Alix, a sophomore guard, is second in the conference with a 47.1-percent clip and is averaging double figures at 10.6 points per game.

Veja Hamilton ranks second on the team in scoring with 10.8 points per game, while Caitlin Diaz leads the Horned Frogs' rebounders with 6.4 boards a game.

"Just play what we normally do," Mulkey said.

"We'll run with you — we like the transition game. But at the end of transition, make sure you're scoring. Because when they run in transition and they push it, they're going to shoot more 3s than we will. You just have to get back in transition and fan out, and not give up the 3 ball very much."

Baylor is coming off a 58-40 win over Kansas on Wednesday in Lawrence, Kan., marking the team's first true road win of the season. Before that, all of the Lady Bears' wins away from the Ferrell Center were in neutral sites.

With the Big 12 getting more and more competitive each season — only one team is currently under .500 overall — any win on the road is a plus. But not dropping a home contest is equally as crucial, and Baylor has only lost two games at the Ferrell Center over the last five seasons.

"It's big to get a road win, period," Mulkey said. "There are some kids in that locker room that have never won in the Big 12 on the road, so it was a first for those players. You have to sneak road wins and you have to make sure you take care of your games at home. We know on the road that there could be the possibility of losing more games — it's just hard."

TCU has not beaten Baylor since 1991 during the Southwest Conference days, with the Lady Bears currently riding an 18-game winning streak. Now in their second year under head coach Raegan Pebley, the Horned Frogs appear on track to improve on last year's 18-14 record, when they finished in a tie for third in the conference at 9-9.

"I saw it last year, how much better they were," Mulkey said. "Her style — she likes to get up and down the floor and she likes to spread the floor on you.

"She's one of my favorite coaches in the profession. We have a lot in common — we just talk basketball and have fun and text little messages to each other. When you see a coach like that, young in the profession, you want them to have success. We just don't want them to have it against Baylor. So I'm not surprised in the least."

No. 6 Baylor's dominance inside overwhelms TCU

The TCU women's basketball team did a good job eliminating Baylor All-American Nina Davis on the offensive end of the court.

However, with the mismatches between the two programs in the post, No. 6 Baylor didn't need its All-American to secure a dominating 72-55 win over the Horned Frogs on Saturday at the Ferrell Center.

Baylor (16-1, 3-1 Big 12) scored 52 of its 72 points in the paint with 6-foot-4 freshman post Beatrice Mompremier scoring a career-high-tying 18 points.

Kalani Brown, a 6-foot-7 freshman post, scored 15 points in an effort sparked by a meeting with Baylor coach Kim Mulkey after the Lady Bears' 52-45 loss at Oklahoma State on Dec. 30.

Baylor dominated the boards 42-29 and first pulled away in the second quarter after a 20-6 run sparked by an 11-0 rebounding advantage that spanned five minutes between the first and second quarters.

"What I think Baylor's bigs do is build their guards' confidence," TCU coach Raegan Pebley said. "Their guards can take really whatever shot they want because they know their bigs are underneath to try and get some offensive rebounds and get themselves to the foul line."

Eighteen Lady Bears points came off second chances, thanks to 14 offensive rebounds. Baylor has yet to be out rebounded this season.

TCU (10-5, 2-2) opened the game on an 8-2 run, leading by six midway through the first quarter.

By halftime, Baylor had a 26-11 advantage in rebounds and led 35-27.

Led by senior Zahna Medley's 4-for-7 clip from behind the arc, TCU finished shooting 36.4 percent from 3-point range against the best statistical 3-point defense in the conference.

Medley led TCU in scoring with 16 points, followed closely by AJ Alix with 15 points, who shot 4-for-8 from 3-point range.

The Frogs, however, shot only 33 percent from the field (16 of 48), six baskets coming late in the game as Mulkey began to substitute the depth of her bench. Baylor led by as much as 25.

"You can't just be willing to shoot quickly all the time against Baylor," Pebley said. "You have to work for the best shot, not just a shot. Their bigs do a great job contesting shots inside. They don't give you many second-chance opportunities because of their rebounding."

Freshman post Jordan Moore played 17 of her best minutes this season against the Big 12's deepest unit of posts, recording 11 points, five rebounds and two blocks. Fatigue and physicality are the two biggest hurdles she faces in her young career, Pebley said.

"A player like Jordan Moore is a freshman and she has to learn through the most expensive kind of experience and that's going through it yourself," Pebley said. "Jordan took steps forward and that's what we need to see out of a freshman post player is that you just keep building, adding to your game."

TCU has some relief Wednesday after losses this past week to No. 17 Oklahoma and the Bears, playing a Texas Tech team it already beat in Lubbock. But holding onto the lessons from a difficult loss is a part of Pebley's system at TCU.

"Our team is a process," she said. "We're going to be more focused on our process than our outcome because that's what we're about. We're going to continue to grow."

Lady Bears' freshmen shine in 72-55 win over TCU

The transition from high school to college is never easy for a women's basketball player.

But two of Baylor's newest additions appear to be heading in the right direction.

Beatrice Mompremier scored 18 points and Kalani Brown added 15 as the freshman post duo thrashed the paint to lead the sixth-ranked Lady Bears past TCU, 72-55, on Saturday at the Ferrell Center.

The 6-foot-4 Mompremier and the 6-7 Brown, just 18 and 19 years old, were a combined 15 of 18 from the field and pulled down 11 rebounds to lead a dominant inside showing by Baylor (16-1, 3-1 Big 12), which had struggled at the post in its three previous conference games.

"On paper, they're everything you want," Lady Bears head coach Kim Mulkey said. "But when you get them here, you have to break them down to build them back up. It's not high school anymore. I've been gentle with them for about a month and letting them field good about themselves. But now we're at another level with conference. It was time to turn up the heat. They were either going to respond to it, or they were going to fold. And I think they both responded."

Both former McDonald's All-Americans in high school, the towering freshmen were highly touted prospects on their way to Baylor. For a team that once featured 6-8 superstar Brittney Griner, the pair were considered the next wave of talented posts to join the Lady Bears.

They've battled through growing pains in early Big 12 play, but haven't been without flashes of brilliance this season. Saturday was no exception.

"We had a little 'come to Jesus' meeting after the loss to OSU," Brown said, referring to Baylor's lone loss against Oklahoma State on Dec. 30 in Stillwater. "We had to be more aggressive and (Mulkey) got on us."

Brown's day was highlighted by a clutch layup at the buzzer at the end of the first quarter, which put the Lady Bears ahead, 18-17. They never trailed again.

Overall, it was a solid day for Baylor's entire post rotation, not just the freshmen. With Khadijah Cave's eight-point, eight-rebound day, the Lady Bears' three main centers combined for 41 points and 19 rebounds.

"You're big — God blessed you, use it," Mulkey said. "They allowed people to three-quarter them, and they want to use the old high school lob. At this level, you aren't going to get a lob — people are on help side. So when people three-quarter you, whip your leg and keep working them until I see your numbers. If I'm a guard, I'm not throwing it to you unless I see your numbers."

More importantly, the strong play from the posts helped offset an uncharacteristically low 2-point day for All-American Nina Davis, who averages just over 17 a game.

Davis was held to 1 for 6 from the field and didn't get to the free-throw line at all.

"She's entitled to have an off night," Mulkey said. "Nina doesn't miss many of the shots she took today. They played a zone, and sometimes in a zone it's hard to find her.

"You have to present yourself in a way where we get it to you. It's good in a lot of ways because we had to play without her in the first half, and grow up when your All-American doesn't have a good day."

Kristy Wallace scored 11 points for Baylor, including a buzzer-beating 3-pointer with a second left off the inbound to close out the third quarter. Alexis Jones added 10 points and seven rebounds and Niya Johnson tallied six points and a team-best eight assists.

The Lady Bears shot 53 percent from the field and dominated the boards with a 42-29 rebounding advantage. They outscored TCU 52-10 in the paint. Tough defense

Defensively, Baylor frustrated the Horned Frogs' looks inside the perimeter. TCU's 3-point percentage (36.4 percent) was higher than its percentage up close (33.3 percent).

"A lot of people want to focus on Baylor's offense, but Baylor has good defense, too," TCU head coach Raegan Pebley said. "You can't be always willing to shoot quickly against Baylor. You have to work for the best shot, not just a shot."

Alexis Prince made her first appearance for Baylor since Nov. 16 after missing the last 14 games with a right knee injury. She underwent surgery during her absence to repair a torn meniscus.

She got in 10 minutes of work, scoring two points with two rebounds and an assist.

"She's by no means the same Alexis she was months ago when she got hurt, but she's ahead of schedule," Mulkey said. "It was seven weeks Thursday, so she's ahead of schedule. We thought she'd be out 12 weeks but if she can build on this in practice each day, she will help us. She can just hit the 3 shots, she's big, she can rebound for us. It's good to have her back out there for us today."

TCU hit four early 3-pointers to lead by as much as six in the first quarter. The Horned Frogs were up 17-13 before Brown scored the last five points of the period including the go-ahead shot at the buzzer to put her team up by one.

Baylor poured it on to start the second quarter, opening with a 9-2 run and holding TCU scoreless for more than three minutes to take a 27-19 lead. The Lady Bears led 35-27 at intermission.

Mompremier scored nine points in the third quarter, including five on a 9-0 Baylor run midway through the period. The Horned Frogs hit two more 3-pointers down the stretch, then Wallace's trey at the buzzer gave the Lady Bears a 58-42 advantage through three.

Brown scored Baylor's first eight points of the fourth to expand the lead to 24. With four minutes remaining in the game, Mulkey pulled her regulars and let the bench finish the game.

TCU romps, Medley moves up in record books in win over Texas Tech

As TCU set a Big 12 milestone, defeating Texas Tech by the Horned Frogs' biggest margin since joining the conference, 69-48, senior guard Zahna Medley continued to move up the ranks as one of TCU's best all-time offensive players.

Wednesday, Medley had eight assists, moving into third place all time in career assists, passing Jill Sutton's 445.

"It's definitely exciting, but it wouldn't be possible if my teammates didn't make the shots,"

Medley said. "I'm just trying to find when they're open and give them the ball." Of her eight assists, four resulted in field goals from fellow senior Veja Hamilton, who finished with a team-high 14 points.

"Me and Z, we have really good chemistry," Hamilton said. "I guess that's just from playing with each other. She has a lot of confidence in me and I have a lot of confidence in her that she'll find us when we're open and we'll hit the shots for her."

TCU also completed the season sweep of the Lady Raiders after winning the first matchup on Dec. 30 in Lubbock 78-69.

The game was tied at 17 at the beginning of the second quarter when TCU found post Jordan Moore for four of her eight points.

While TCU (11-5, 3-2 Big 12) leads the conference in 3-point shooting percentage, coach Raegan Pebley said a balanced offensive attack was a focus of practice after TCU's 72-55 loss to Baylor on Saturday.

In that game, TCU shot a better clip from behind the arc (36.4) than from the field (33.3).

"It's definitely been something that we're trying to work on more because we didn't want to rely on 3-point shooting as much," Hamilton said.

"We had really good practices leading up to the game and we were able to continue to execute like we were in practice."

TCU moved to a press late in the first half, sparking a 10-2 run thanks to four Lady Raiders turnovers.

Pebley said she was worried that her team might be a little fatigued after several hard practices following the Baylor loss that worked on more physical play against the Frogs' all-male practice squad, which just returned to campus from Christmas break.

That physical play showed up closing out the game Wednesday against Tech (9-7, 0-5 Big 12), which was lacking in TCU's two previous losses to Oklahoma and Baylor.

"We had to rebuild our identity and find our mojo through work ethic," Pebley said. "I felt like them handling school being back in session and tough practices and really focusing in on what needed to get done today, showed a lot of maturity and growth from our team."

K-State holds off TCU, 58-49

Six games into the Big 12 schedule, Kansas State head coach Jeff Mittie has a pretty good handle on what his team does best and where it still needs to improve.

Facing one of the league's top scoring offenses, the Wildcats played to their strengths and got it done on defense, holding off a fourth-quarter rally by TCU and winning 58-49 Saturday night at Bramlage Coliseum in front of 7,525 fans on "Pack the House" night.

Mittie said the defensive performance was one of his team's best of the season.

"I think so, because the opponent is a very good offensive team and they're one of the best 3-point shooting teams in the Big 12," he said. "I think they're No. 1 actually, right now. So we knew we had our hands full. We kept trying to get our group to get their shooters inside the arc, into all our size. And they still hit some tough floaters." (AJ) Alix hit that tough floater to cut it to three, but all in all, our group really took the game plan and really did

a nice job."

K-State (12-5, 2-4 Big 12) led the entire game, but allowed the Horned Frogs to trim a 15-point third-quarter deficit to just seven by the end of the period.

The run continued in the fourth, with TCU (11-6, 3-3) cutting the lead three points at 48-45 on a basket by Alix with 4:56 to play.

But K-State locked down defensively from there, outscoring the Horned Frogs 10-4 and holding TCU to 2-of-12 shooting the rest of the way, despite only making 8 of 13 free throw attempts in the fourth quarter.

"I kept telling them about poise, and for the most part I think we did a decent job of that," Mittie said. "When they cut it to three, I think we did an excellent job of getting the ball inside and sticking to our offense. That, to me, was the key to the game. When they made their run back at us, we kept our poise and were able to get the ball where we wanted to."

Offensively, K-State had an obvious plan to get the ball to Bre Lewis as much as possible. The junior finished with 25 points and nine rebounds on 12-of-19 shooting. No other player scored in double figures for K-State, though Megan Deines had eight points.

"My team looks to go to me every time, so they did a great job of getting me the ball," Lewis said. "I tried to do my best and execute and finish, and it happened most of the time."

Mittie said he was pleased with the K-State's methodical approach to the offensive side of the ball Saturday.

"I felt like offensively, we had to play at a tempo we were comfortable playing," he said. "The first time we played them, the tempo got away from us. Tonight we were able to mix it to where we would attack, but we would also slow things down and were able to take advantage of our size."

TCU got 13 points from Alix in the loss, with Toree Thompson and Zahna Medley each scoring eight. Medley had 27 points in the first matchup between these two schools earlier this season in an 87-73 TCU win.

Deines drew the defensive assignment on Medley most of the night.

"(Medley) can drive it, she can shoot it, so what coach wanted was for her to not catch the ball at all," Deines said. "So literally my only job was for her to not catch the ball. It feels great to know she couldn't do what she's really good at and to help my team."

As well as K-State played defensively to end the game, the Wildcats were even better in the first half.

They held the Horned Frogs to just 14 points on 6-of-28 (21 percent) shooting in the opening half, while taking a 27-14 lead to the break.

K-State jumped out to a quick 8-2 lead in the first quarter and finishing the period up 13-7.

In the second quarter, the Wildcats took their 13-point halftime lead on a 3-pointer by Riley native Kelly Thomson with 3:06 to play, forcing a TCU timeout.

Both teams went cold to close the half, though, with neither team scoring again before the break.

The Horned Frogs' scoring drought before halftime spanned seven minutes.

K-State had its largest lead of the game at 29-14 when Deines stole TCU's first inbound to begin the half and went the other way for an easy layup.

"It was a big run, but having said that, they're such an explosive offensive team, 15 doesn't really feel like that much," Mittie said. "I knew that we were going to have to grind through the game and I really did feel like they would make a run at it."

TCU women shoot for better things vs. No. 6 Texas

On Saturday, TCU shot 28.3 percent in a 58-49 loss to Kansas State, its lowest field-goal percentage since posting a 27.6 clip against Texas in the teams' last meeting.

On Wednesday, TCU (11-6, 3-3 Big 12) looks to find its stride again at Schollmaier Arena against the Longhorns, ranked No. 6 in the AP Top 25 poll.

Texas (16-1, 5-1) is the third ranked team TCU faces this month. The Horned Frogs lost to No. 19 Oklahoma and at No. 4 Baylor, each by double digits.

TCU guard Zahna Medley needs three points to pass Frogs assistant coach and former Longhorn Edwina Brown into 32nd on the Big 12's career scoring list. Medley scored eight points Saturday to surpass 1,700.

Medley and the Horned Frogs will face the conference's second-best scoring defense against Texas. The Longhorns give up an average of 53.4 points per game, bested only by Baylor's 52.9 average.

Working in TCU's favor are its three players holding the top three spots in the Big 12 in 3-point field goal percentage: Toree Thompson (45.2), AJ Alix (45.1) and Medley (43.6).

TCU women lose lead in fourth quarter to No. 6 Texas

The TCU women's basketball team has proven it can hang with the best in the nation.

They just can't close the deal.

Wednesday, after leading for just shy of 30 minutes, TCU couldn't hold on to a lead that got as large as 11 points, falling to No. 6 Texas 65-58 for its fourth loss in five games.

On Nov. 21, TCU (11-7, 3-4 Big 12) held an eight-point lead over then No. 12 Texas A&M with 8 minutes left before an Aggies comeback that won the game 82-78.

The Horned Frogs led for 32 minutes.

Two weeks before that, TCU led by eight with just over six minutes to play before then No. 17 Oklahoma closed the game on an 18-1 run to win 78-65. TCU had led for 34 minutes.

Wednesday, TCU held a three-point lead early in the fourth quarter, but Texas (17-1, 6-1 Big 12) outscored the Horned Frogs 23-15 in the frame, including seven points off five TCU turnovers.

"It's part of a process of developing a program that's going to go from good to great," Pebley said. "It doesn't happen overnight. You have to go through these experiences. We've got young players getting great experience."

TCU freshman post Jordan Moore guarded Texas senior center Imani Boyette for most of the first half, during which Boyette netted eight points and pulled down four rebounds.

The Longhorns senior finished with a game-high 19 points and 10 rebounds, marking her 10th double-double of the season.

For TCU, both Zahna Medley and AJ Alix finished with 12 points, with Medley going 3 for 6 from behind the arc.

With her first 3-pointer of the game early in the second quarter, Medley passed the 1,703 career points total of TCU assistant coach and former Longhorns standout Edwina Brown, taking possession of 33rd place in Big 12 history.

"It's definitely exciting, but we didn't get the

win, so I'm not really focused on that right now," Medley said. "It's definitely exciting and I'm so thankful to be where I am and to have a coach like her."

TCU's third leading scorer, Veja Hamilton, had trouble knocking down mid-range jumpers, shooting 3 for 14 on the night. Hamilton posted one of the conference's best field goal percentages last season.

"The only way I know how to help her outside of just mechanics is, you have got to get in the gym and get extra shots," Pebley said. "That's the way you build confidence is work. You don't find the confidence in the game. You find the confidence in the gym, by yourself when nobody is looking."

Texas stands tall in second half, beats TCU

Texas was on the verge of dropping the ball Wednesday night until the Longhorns cleaned up their problem with turnovers.

The Longhorns, who had 14 turnovers in the first half, appeared to have a Baylor hangover until they cleaned up their act in the second half. Texas had a total of just two miscues in the final 20 minutes, and Imani Boyette came alive down the stretch to give the Longhorns a 65-58 victory over TCU at Schollmaier Arena.

Boyette was the game's offensive and defensive star, finishing with game-highs in points (19), rebounds (10) and blocked shots (6).

Texas (17-1, 6-1 in the Big 12) outscored TCU 37-25 in the second half. TCU (11-7, 3-4), led for about 34 minutes, but failed to close the deal.

Brianna Taylor gave Texas the lead for good with a free throw with 5:08 to play. A short banker by Boyette roughly 30 seconds later put the Horns ahead 55-52.

Although TCU would close the margin to one point down the stretch, the Horned Frogs would never reclaim the lead.

Coach Karen Aston called it a "big bounce-back win" following Saturday's 80-67 loss to Baylor.

"Last year we would have let one disappointing loss turn into two, and two turn into three," Aston said. "Specifically, we showed a lot of maturity. Last year we would have had trouble resetting at halftime. Tonight the players did it themselves. The coaches did make some good adjustments, but you could see the players were more engaged in the second half. They didn't want to lose."

Aston said it was a "team win," giving credit to reserves Ariel Atkins (13 points) and Brianna Taylor (9 points, 5 rebounds).

Wagner's Ramirez signs with Horned Frogs

Shortly after TCU received Amber Ramirez's national letter of intent Nov. 12 to play women's basketball for the school, Horned Frogs coach Raegan Pebley tweeted a picture of her and Wagner's star guard.

The tweet: "Seen Amber literally shoot the lights out. She's in the gym, she's in range! Welcome to the #FrogFam."

Pebley was clearly excited to have landed one of the country's most electrifying high school shooting guards. Ramirez was the nation's 13th-ranked recruit for the 2016 class, according to ESPN. Ramirez is the second-highest recruit signed by TCU in program history.

"Amber is one of the top scoring guards in the country," Pebley said in a news release. "She has in the gym type of range and is so creative off the bounce."

That assessment isn't news to area basketball fans. Ramirez was named the San Antonio Express-News' player of the year last season. She led the area with a 26.9 point average. She made 91 of 227 (40.1 percent) of her 3-point shots. She set a UIL state tournament record for most 3-pointers in a game, with eight against Houston Cypress Woods during the 6A semifinals.

"I don't know if there's a shooter in the nation like her," Wagner coach Christina Camacho said. "I'm not just saying that. I watch a lot of college games, and if she takes that with her — her shooting ability — she's going to be outstanding." Ramirez signed with TCU several months after withdrawing a commitment she made to Oklahoma State during her junior season. Ramirez had said at that time she wanted to reassess her situation after several players left the Oklahoma State program. "I feel like I committed (to Oklahoma State) too early," Ramirez said. "I stepped back and viewed everything, and now that I've signed with TCU, it was the right move that I made."

When Ramirez jumped back into the recruiting market, dozens of coaches flocked to Wagner's gym to watch her practice and woo her to their schools. "It was fun having all those schools come to Wagner, but it kind of got stressful," Ramirez said. "I am relieved and happy now that I'm done with it." Camacho quipped during Ramirez's signing that Wagner's practices will be less busy because there won't be as many college recruiters.

"It was very stressful for her," Camacho said. "There were days she'd come in drained. I could tell that it took a little toll."

Camacho said TCU is perfect for Ramirez.

"TCU is such a great fit for her," Camacho said. "I've met the TCU coaching staff. They all have WNBA experience. They are a very smart coaching staff. Coach Pebley is outstanding. I'm really glad she's going there and staying in Texas, so I can watch her."

Wagner's Ramirez named McDonald's All American

Amber Ramirez waited all day and most of the evening Sunday to find out if she was going to be a McDonald's All American.

"I didn't want to think about it because I didn't want it to get to me," said Ramirez, a senior point guard at Wagner. "Once it hit about 8:30, 9 o'clock (p.m.), that when I said, 'I'm about to find out.' It's

been a long day."

And then right before 10 p.m. she saw her name listed on the East roster during a selection show broadcast on ESPNU.

"I'm in shock that I made the team," said Ramirez, who is committed to TCU. "It's a dream come true. I'm excited right now. Words can't explain."

Ramirez, who is the 13th-ranked recruit for the 2016 class by ESPN, is the area's leading scorer this season with a 26.4-point average.

Ramirez is one of six Texans selected for the 24 roster spots on the girls teams. Ramirez will team with Plano West's Natalie Chou, Cedar Hill's Joyner Holmes, Duncanville's Ciera Johnson and Houston Cypress Woods' Nancy Mulkey on the East. Flower Mound's Lauren Cox will be on the West. The game is scheduled for March 30 at Chicago's United Center.

This is the third year in a row an area player has been selected for the game. Clemens grad Kyra Lambert, who is now at Duke, played in the 2015 McDonald's game. Two years ago, FEAST product Reece' Caldwell, who is now at Texas Tech, was chosen.

Ramirez was one of nine area players — eight girls and one boy — who were among the 755 nominees from across the nation. They included Brennan's Jake Valero, Southwest's Alexandra Busby, Steele's Alexes Bryant, Clemens' Kennedy Centers, Clark's Ria Gulley, Reagan's Sara Lewis, Brennan's Monique Terry and Judson's Anabelle Tovar.

Last week, Ramirez was one of 25 girls — and the only one from the area — selected to the Naismith Trophy Girls High School Midseason Team. Before the season, Ramirez was one of 20 players named to USA Today's All-USA preseason girls team.

The Express-News named Ramirez its Player of the Year last season after she led the Thunderbirds to their second straight UIL state tournament. She set a state tournament record last season by making eight 3-pointers in a game in a Class 6A state semifinal loss to Houston Cypress Woods.

"I'm very honored and blessed to be in the position that I'm in right now," Ramirez said. "I'm thankful for everyone who has surrounded me and been there for me."
